## To the Growers of Fruit.

EDITOR HERALD: In my second article I spoke of pruning apple trees, and as the time is at hand to do the work, I shall remind the small-fruit growers of taking up the necessary pruning of all small fruit, such as goose berries, raspberries and others of this kind, and also currants. Top all your berry plants heavy, and train pipes or stems where you wish them to grow and tie them to stay; have all last year's growth removed and dead leaves and litter cleaned up from under your plants and refuse burned. Never allow such to lay around and produce fungus diseases or harbor insects. Currants and other berries over run by small green worms should be sprayed with white hellebore. Take one large table spoonful of hellebore dissolved in two and one-half gallons of water; spray just before blooming and again after fruit has set. Straw-berries should be worked and cleaned before growing begins in the spring of grass and week roots matted with the strawberry roots, should you neglect to work them in time you will injure your plants to such an extent that your crop will be greatly reduced.

Melon, cucumber vines, pumpkins, etc., overrun with larva, slugs, cat-terpillars and biting or eating insects should be sprayed with Paris green spray. First spray, Paris green, four ounces, lime, two pounds, water 40 gallons. Slack lime; make paste of Paris green, then mix thor-oughly, add water. Second spray, only one pound lime. Paris green as a commercial article is shame-fully adulterated; insist on getting the pure stuff. For any further in-formation write to M. G. Pohn, Myrtle Point.

Cleveland, March 4.—Over 150 school children lost their lives to- day in a fire which destroyed the three-story brick school building on Collamer avenue in Collwood, a suburb just outside the city limits. At 2 o'clock this afternoon 146 bodies were recovered, and it is be- lieved there are several others in the ruins. The fire started in the basement about 10 o'clock, after school convened. It was caused by an overheated furnace.
