A Great Enterprise.

J. S. N. Smith, consulting engineer of the Coquille Valley Power Company, made our office a pleasant call one day last week when on his way to Bandon, and gave us considerable information in regard to the new company and its purposes.

While the full value of such a power plant as this company expects to develop would be hard to comprehend, at the same time any one can see at a glance that its significance is for reaching and the developments it will bring about will be innumerable.

The projectors are local people who have formed a corporation with the following named as its officers: E. F. Davenport, Pres.; C. C. Carter, Vice Pres.; B. E. Hendricks, Sec.; Directors, J. R. Benson, C. C. Carter, E. F. Davenport, B. F. Henderson and D. H. Johnson. Preliminary work is now in progress on the immense water power plant which is to be established at the N. Harry place on the East Fork. All surveys have been made and this plant will not cost nearly as much as the average plant, in accordance to the amount of power developed.

The capital stock of the corporation is \$50,000, divided into shares of \$100 each, a considerable quantity which has been taken.

Figures show that at least 3,000 horsepower can be developed, and it is thought that it will be possible to reach 4,000 horsepower.

The water is to be piped a distance 5,000 feet from the reservoir which will be the source of supply to the power station, at which point it will have a fall of 300 feet. The Power will be transmitted from the power station to Myrtle Point, Coquille Marshfield, North Bend and Bandon by electricity, thus giving these towns the advantage of a 24-hour-a-day power service that will do more to develop manufacturing industries than anything that could be introduced. Only a limited amount of stock will be sold, but that is going rapidly at par.

The next meeting of the Coquille Educational League will be held at the school building Friday afternoon at 3:30. The subject for the afternoon is "Beautifying the School Grounds" led by Mr. J. J. Stanley. It is hoped that there will be a good attendance.

Mrs. Robert McCann, of North Bend, was in town yesterday. She is doing some of the work necessary to get under way the organization of a W. C. T. U. in this city. An organizer, Miss Rose Davison, is expected here by the last of this month.

The speaking tryout to select the three representatives of the High school in the speaking contest against Bandon will be held Friday evening March, 20th. Full announcement will be made later.

All attending the meeting of the Educational League next Friday afternoon are requested to bring a written question to be discussed at the May meeting.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Notice is hereby given that the Beaver Slough Drainage District will receive sealed bids for the construction of a drainage system in said district, in Coos County, Oregon, which will include the following:

One ditch 416 feet long, 36 feet wide on the bottom, at the river bank, being the outlet of said proposed drainage system.

One ditch 2640 feet long, 24 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

One ditch 3584 feet long, 6 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

One ditch 5730 feet long, 20 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

One ditch 1968 feet long, 10 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

One ditch 7776 feet long, 24 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

One ditch 3696 feet long, 10 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

One ditch 3102 feet long, 6 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

One ditch 3826 feet long, 6 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep, approximately.

Containing approximately in all 80,000 cubic yards, and all ditches to be excavated to the level of extreme low tide.

The construction of one dyke on the upper portion of Beaver slough 4090 feet long, 4 1/2 feet high, 2 feet wide on top and slope of 45°.

The construction of one dyke 212 feet long, across mouth of slough on upper portion of J. A. Davenport's land, at river bank, to be 2 feet higher than river bank, 10 feet wide on top and slope of sides 45°.

The construction of a dyke at the mouth of China Camp Creek, 30 feet long, 2 feet higher than river bank at that place, 10 feet wide on top and slope of sides 45°.

One tide gate at the mouth of main ditch.

The clearing of land and removal of all stumps necessary for all ditches, dykes and tide gates.
