NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

Notice is hereby given that the Fat Elk Drainage District will receive sealed bids for the construction of a drainage system in said District, in Coos County, Oregon, which will include the following:

One main canal 33 feet wide, 8712 feet long.

One ditch, 14 feet wide, 6000 feet long.

Ditches 2240 feet long, 8 feet wide.

Ditches 4020 feet long, 4 feet wide.

Containing in all of said ditches, approximately, 169,000 cubic yards.

The right of way of all ditches to be cleared three times the width of the ditch.

The width of all ditches is taken at the top, and are to be excavated to the level of extreme low tide, and having side slopes of 45'.

The average depth of ditches has been estimated at approximately, 5 6-10 feet.

All ditches to be dug along the lines and at the places indicated by the plans, map and survey of said drainage system now on file in the office of the County Clerk of Coos County, Oregon.

Bids will be considered for the complete system or any portion thereof.
