### Oratorical Contest.

Last Friday evening the Oratorical Association of the High School held a public meeting to select representatives against Bandon. Mrs. W. C. Chase, Mrs. Helen M. Nye, and Miss Nellie Kerrigan acting as judges. To those who enjoy a clean, wholesome entertainment of a high order, the program as rendered afforded a rare literary treat. The participants surprised all their friends in the splendid account they gave of themselves. Those who took part and the titles and classifications of the pieces were as follows: Oratorical Selections—Catalina's Defiance, Esther Boyd; The Curse of Regulus, Maud Ellingsen; Spartacus to the Gladiators, Eva Sugg; Dramatic selections—Thots for a discouraged Farmer, Hattie Sweet; On the Frontier, Leta Mast; The Chariot Race, Belle Thrift; The Gypsy Flower Girl, Iva Howey. Humorous selections—Tim Crane and Widow Bedott, Mildred Slocum; Columbia Crumb, Nettie Belloni; Sunday Fishing, Neita Smith. In the oratorical class, Eva Sugg was awarded first place; in the dramatic, Iva Howey; and in the humorous, Mildred Slocum. According to the marking of the judges the two closest competitors were in the dramatic class, Iva Howey winning over Belle Thrift by less than one per cent. Friday evening of this week the contest with Bandon will take place at the Masonic Hall. It is planned to have the program begin exactly at 8:30. Come and hear the promising talent of these two towns, in their praiseworthy competition. An admission of 25 cents will be charged—members of the school will be admitted for 15 cents—and the proceeds will be used to bear the expense of the Bandon delegation, the expense of the Hall, and incidental expenses of the Association.

### Duel By Mistake.

### Pomona Wrecked.

San Francisco, March 18.—The first of the passengers of the illfated Pomona, wrecked on the submerged reef off Port Ross last evening, arrived here this afternoon. Sixteen went overland to Cazadero and 84 passengers and 62 members of the crew will arrive here this afternoon on the steamer Topeka. The Pomona will be a total wreck. The Pomona plied between San Francisco and Eureka, and was one of the best known vessels in northern Pacific waters. How she happened to run on the reef has not been explained.

### Foretells Disaster.

Beloit, Wis., March 10.—The roaring well on the Charles Lathers farm near here, sounds from which preceded the San Francisco disaster, is again emitting rumbling noises and a strong wind from its cavernous depths. It is asserted that the well began roaring a few weeks before the San Francisco earthquake, and ceased exactly at the hour of the quake.
