Notice is hereby given that the Fat Elk Drainage District will receive sealed bids for the construction of a drainage system in said district, in Coos County, Oregon, which will include the following: One main canal 33 feet wide, 8712 feet long.

One ditch, 14 feet wide, 6600 feet long.

Ditches 22440 feet long, 8 feet wide.

Ditches 4620 feet long, 4 feet wide.

Containing in all of said ditches, approximately, 100,000 cubic yards.

The right of way of all ditches to be cleared three times the width of the ditch.

The width of all ditches is taken at the bottom, and are to be excavated to the level of extreme low tide, and having side slopes of 45°.

The average depth of ditches has been estimated at approximately, 5 to 6 feet.


