The present term of circuit court bids fair to be a long one or at any rate, consume all the time Judge Hamilton and District Attorney Prown will have before they are due to hold court in Douglas county. The greater portion of time so far has been given to two cases, that of the state against John Kelly for stabbing, Wirren, in which case a jury disagreed at a former trial. This trial resulted in the acquittal of Kelly.

J. C. Wilcox of North Bend, was convicted of conducting a house of ill fame. He gets his sentence today.

G. G. Swan, of Dora, is circulating a petition which is being generally signed, asking that Coos county give bounties on the scalps of wild animals as follows: On panthers, \$10; on coyotes, \$5; wild or "bob" cats, \$3. There is no question at all but the encouragement of the destruction of those animals would be the greatest and most economical way in which our game can be protected. One family of panthers would kill more deer in a year than are unlawfully killed by half the gunners of the county. And as it is well known that wild cats are the worst enemies young sheep and goats have in this part of the county, it is safe to say that they destroy fawns. There are not many coyotes yet, but it is known that there are a few on the upper river, and it is well worth while to encourage someone to see to it that they do not get too numerous.

The consumption of 86 million gallons of alcohol in the United Kingdom, for 1906) cost the consumers 25 millions sterling more than are required for the entire cost of the civil and military expenses for the year. We have a right to expect that the law, which is ideally the guardian of the state, will before long do more than it has ever yet attempted for removing or reducing public temptations to indulgence in the liquors that are powerless for good and powerful for evil.—Dr. Dawson Burns in London Times.

New Orleans, April 30.—Practically complete reports from the sections of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Tennessee which were swept by the recent tornado show that the death toll reached a total of 502, and the injured totaled 2,208. The death list includes all those who died in the hospitals at New Orleans, Natchez and other cities.

Rome, April 30.—Natives living in the vicinity of Mt. Etna are trembling in fear, many of them fleeing in wild panic, because a serious is hourly expected.—For several days the volcano has been emitting great columns of black smoke. These are accompanied by rumblings and earth tremors throughout the island. Crops in many places have been ruined by the ashes that have fallen in great quantities within a radius of many miles of the crater.
