

Fleet Will Stop Awhile

Secretary Walter Lyon of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, late today received the following self-explanatory telegram from Senator Bourne:

"Secretary Newbury has ordered Atlantic Battleship fleet to stop off Coos Bay, the weather permitting." Arrangements will be immediately begun for Coos Bay people to welcome the vessels even though they do not come into this harbor. An effort will be made to have the day declared a holiday in North Bend and Marshfield as advice is received when the vessels will pass up the coast.

It is possible that the Breakwater, Eureka or Alliance, which ever one happens to be in port at the time, may be chartered to take some North Bend and Marshfield people out to see the fleet.

Many others are planning to go to Cape Arago or Sunset Bay and view the passing fleet from there. Some are planning to make it a picnic day, taking their lunches and enjoying a holiday.

Much will depend on the weather and the hour that the fleet will pass up the coast en route to Seattle.—Coos Bay Times.

Debate at Bandon

On Friday the steamer Dispatch made an excursion to Bandon carrying a large crowd including the debaters from the high school in this city who met those of Bandon in a contest that evening before a large audience in the new "Oriental Hall" in that place. The subject of the debate was, Resolved that the best means of building up the American marine is by a system of ship subsidies." The affirmative was upheld by the Misses Blanch Radley and Maude Lowe and Roy Corson, of Bandon, while the negative was supported by Misses Jessie Sweet and Dorothy Watson and Owen Knowlton, of Coquille. It was a hard-fought battle, both sides being well informed along the lines of argument and showed marked skill and training by their respective teachers, the Professors Ostein and Darring. The decision was given to the Bandon speakers by a few points in elocution, the arguments of those of Coquille being equally as well sustained as those of the Bandon class. The judges were Prof. G. Conley, of Riverton; Attorney J. D. D. Goss and J. W. Snover, of Marshfield. Everything went off smoothly and satisfactorily, and all agree that great good has been accomplished in more ways than one.

Shooting at Marshfield.

The following excerpt is taken from the Coos Bay Times:

Mrs. E. S. Gordon of North Bend, "The woman of mystery on Coos Bay," was shot and through to be fatally wounded on the launch Bonita, at its moorings at the O'Kelly offices, by Holland Anderson, a bartender, at midnight Saturday. Mrs. Gordon is now at the General hospital hovering between life and death and Anderson is in the city jail.

The entire affair is clouded in mystery, mystery almost as deep as that which clothes the past of the woman in the case. Widely different tales of the shooting and the causes that lead up to it are told by Anderson and Mrs. Gordon and to the wild rumors that have been circulated by those who were on the ground soon after the affray there is no end.

The strange career of Mrs. Gordon, Bertha E. Leach or whatever her name may be, for she has borne several, adds to the interest that naturally centers in the tragedy. An adventure of a strange type, her mode of living, her connection with E. S. Gordon, the sensations attached to her arrest on the charge of counterfeiting in Portland a few years ago, the denouncement of a mock marriage at Vancouver in which she was alleged to have been a figure and escapades in Marshfield and North Bend, have served to make her an extraordinary character. All this has occurred in the brief space of four or five years during which she has been known to Coos Bay. What marked the thirty odd years of her life previous to that no one here knows and on it her lips are sealed even though she has been apprised that death will probably soon close them forever. Rumor has it that she is the daughter of a once prominent and wealthy Spanish family of or near Oakland, Cal., but that is mere rumor.

The prisoner has been brought to the county seat, and owing to the fact that the grand jury was in session at the time of the shooting no preliminary hearing was had and all evidence of consequence is in their hands, and they are withholding action in the matter awaiting results, as the length of time the victim lives after the injury governs the nature of the charge. Last reports indicate that Mrs. Gordon cannot last more than a few hours at most.
