Peter Loggie of North Bend, to day concluded a contract with the management of the Breakwater to bring the new government dredge which is to be used in improving the bar and channel of Coos Bay harbor, here in August.

The contract provides for the payment of \$500 for towing it here from Portland and stipulates that it shall be brought in August.

The announcement that the dredge will be brought here in August is very gratifying to shipping interests of Coos Bay as it means that there will be no delay in the harbor improvement work here.

Owing to the peculiar wording of the bill passed by congress providing funds for the operation of the dredge it was feared that the dredge might not be brought here immediately after its completion. The contract made by Mr. Loggie makes this certain.

The Portland Iron Works is building the dredge and has been able to rush the work so that it will be completed a month earlier than the contract called for.

Mr. Loggie has had supervision of the work, being selected for this by Colonel S. W. Roessler.—Coos Bay Times.
