Case of Rare Modesty.

When a Minister of the Gospel labors in a single community for eighteen years, and at a maximum annual stipend of \$400; it can truly be said of that man that his personal sacrifice to the cause in which he enlisted is great. When in pure appreciation of that sacrifice his church conference proposes to raise his yearly compensation to \$1000, and that minister modestly demurs with the assertion that he "is not worth it," we are furnished an example of rare unselfish service that, in this day and age, it is difficult to match.

At yesterday's session of the Episcopal conference Rev. Horsfall delivered an address upon his mission work at Coos Bay, where he has been stationed, for the time mentioned, as a humble disciple of the man of Nazareth. Following this address, Bishop Seadding called attention to the faithful and uncomplaining character of Mr. Horsfall's ministrations, dwelling upon the personal sacrifice that has been made for so many years, and announcing that the ministerial salary had been raised in this instance to \$1000, an act which had met with the entire approval of the church authorities. It was upon this announcement that Rev. Wm. Horsfall made the almost unprecedented request that the increased salary be reduced, on the plea of unworthiness.

There may be better men in the service of the church than the Rev. Wm. Horsfall; but, without the honor of a personal acquaintance we venture to say that the people who know him intimately will not admit it.

Modesty like this denotes purity of motive and the quality of simple heroism which go hand in hand with genuine righteousness. There is evidence here of rare endowment; of a reward, in the consciousness of well-doing, that transcends money values.

In the selfish struggle for the acquisition of this world's goods, we have grown wiser than the children of light. It is almost impossible to find a man who is not touched with this peculiar wisdom, whereby we are slow to discern the virtue of self denial. Yet may we hold it to the credit of the race that the type of man exists—however humble his sphere—who appreciates the imperishable riches of service, and of who his fellows with sound hearts must pronounce, "Here is a good man."

Rev. Horsfall has been one of the most faithful workers in the cause which he represents that has ever been in Coos county and the honor bestowed upon him by the church conference was truly merited. He is deserving of any honor that can be shown him but his extreme modesty and true devotion to his work would not allow him to accept the offer, he rather choosing to work in the cause for the good he can do. Coos county people are proud of Mr. Horsfall's record, and congratulate him upon the high esteem in which he is held in the conference.—Portland Evening Telegram.

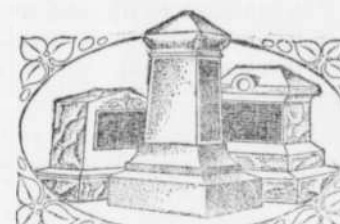
