### Lumbermen Will Organize.

A Hoo Hoo concatenation will be held at Bandon on Wednesday, June 34th.

The aim and object of Hoo Hoo is the bringing together of men in the lumber business and its kindred lines, with a view of taking off the rough spots which comes from lack of acquaintance and social intercourse. The order is growing steadily throughout the United States and especially in the West.

Section 1. It being the purpose of this Order to gather together in fraternal relations people engaged in lumber trade, membership in this Order shall be limited to white male persons over the age of twenty-one years, of good moral character, who possess one or more of the following qualifications:

First—They shall be so engaged, either in the ownership or sale of timber lands, timber or logs, or the manufacture or sale of lumber at wholesale or retail as that it shall be their main or principal occupation, and that it shall be the business which is recognized in the community in which they reside as their vocation. There shall not be admitted under this paragraph bookkeepers, clerks, inspectors, sawyers, fliers, foremen, nor the ordinary laborers of lumber enterprises. It is the intent and meaning of this section that every application from a person who does not come clearly and without question within the provisions of this limitation, must be referred by the Vicegerent Snark to the Snark and Scrivenor, with a full statement of all facts bearing on the case before any action shall be taken thereon.

Second—Newspaper men. By this term being meant only the publishers, proprietors, or persons regularly connected with newspapers.

Third—Railroad men. By this term being meant only general officers, and assistant freight, passenger and claim agents, purchasing agents, commercial traveling, soliciting and contracting freight (not station agents). This means the officials of railroads who come in contact with the patrons of the road. It does not mean office assistants, clerks, secretaries or collectors.

Fourth—Sawmill machinery men. By this term being meant persons engaged in the manufacture or sale to lumber manufacturers of sawmill or planing mill machinery.

Fifth—Only such persons as come strictly within the limitations above made are eligible for membership in the Order, and such persons may be initiated under proper application, payment of initiation fee and election to membership and initiation as provided by the ritual of the Order. Membership shall be limited to 99,999 living members in good standing.

### W. H. Gamble Stricken.

W. H. Gamble, one of the best known business men of Coos Bay and a resident of Southwest Oregon and Coos county for about forty years, died yesterday at Tucson, Ariz., where he went recently in hopes of benefitting his health. The news of his death came as a great shock to his family in North Bend and friends in North Bend and Marshfield as recent reports had indicated that the threatened quick consumption was being overcome and he was getting stronger. A son, Vince Gamble, who accompanied him to Tucson left there a few days ago to return home, believing that his father had recovered sufficiently to warrant his being left alone. An effort is being made today to get in communication with Vince Gamble at San Francisco in order to have him return to Tucson and bring the remains to Coos Bay for burial.—The Times.

San Pedro, Cal., June 6.—Four were killed outright and a score or more United States seamen were severely injured, some fatally, late yesterday afternoon when a boiler-rupture on the United States armored cruiser Tennessee exploded. The death list was increased to five today when E. J. Burns, a coal passer, from New York City succumbed to his injuries after a night of terrible suffering. Several others will probably die.

### High-Grade Ore in Bisbee.

Bisbee, Ariz., June 5.—Bisbee has been given a sensation by the discovery of gold almost in the center of the city. George L. Miller, who came here recently from Los Angeles, while excavating for a new house in Brewery Gulch, noticed the appearance of the quartz being taken out. Miners on the job examined it and declared it high-grade gold ore. Specimens were taken to an assay office, which gave these results: Sixty-two ounces of gold, \$1240; 138 ounces of silver, \$77.28; total value per ton, \$1317.28. Work on the excavation was immediately stopped and three shifts of men are at work sinking a shaft.
