W. H. TAFT NOMINATED.

Roosevelt's Favorite Wins First Place.

Convention Hall, Chicago, June 18.—W. H. Taft was nominated for President on the first ballot by the National Republican Convention. Total delegates 980, Taft 702; Hughes 63, Cannon 61, Fairbanks 40, Knox 68, La Follette 25, Foraker 16, Roosevelt 3 absent 2. 5 18 P. M.—Pennsylvania moved that the nomination be made unanimous. General Woodford seconded motion, and was followed by Mr. Boutell, of Illinois, the Indiana and Wisconsin delegates. The nomination was made unanimous. Re-cess until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

Chicago, Ill., June 19.—Congressman James S. Sherman of New York, was nominated for vice-president on the first ballot by the National Republican Convention here this morning. The ballot was merely a formality, the matter having been arranged at conference during the night. Sherman's selection was due to the belief of the many of the leaders that an eastern man, preferably a New Yorker, must be nominated to maintain the party's strength in eastern states. This feeling resulted in the elimination of Senator Dolliver or Governor Cummins of Iowa, who, according to reports, were the choice of Taft and Roosevelt. Owing to the matter being arranged before the convention came to order today, no particular fight was made in convention. Aside from Mr. Sherman, the other candidates were Governor Curtis Guild of Massachusetts and former Governor Murphy of New Jersey, Fairbanks of Indiana, and Governor Sheldon of Nebraska, received a few complimentary votes on the first ballot which resulted as follows:

Guild 75
Fairbanks 1
Sheldon 10
Absent 1
At the conclusion of the first ballot, a motion by Senator Crane of Massachusetts, and seconded by Governor Fort of New Jersey, the nomination of Mr. Sherman was declared unanimous.

Where Fortunes Grow on Trees

In the Rogue River Valley, in Southern Oregon F. H. Hopkins in 1907, made a profit of \$19,000 off 16 acres of Winter Nels pears—\$1187.50 an acre. In the same valley G. H. Hoyer bought 10 acres of pear orchard at \$560 an acre. Fifteen months later the crop brought him \$9600. Eight years ago J. L. Dumass set out 50 acres of apples near Dayton in the Walla Walla district of Southeastern Washington. In the summer of 1907 he bought 50 acres of apple orchard adjoining his property, at an investment of \$18,000. The apples he picked from these 50 acres at season sold for \$16,000, and the total crop from the 100 acres realized \$52,000—a return to the owner of \$40,000. The statements are incontrovertible, but you instantly demand "What is the explanation?" A climate and soil that are capable of rearing such monsters as the redwood trees and the sequoias, which render measurements of vegetable growth in other regions of this country puny and scant, account in part for these bewildering figures. But there are obscure valleys, narrow and diminutive, mere pockets, between huge mountains, where in the past no plant worthy of cultivation has found so much as a root-hold. And it is in many just such spots as these that the returns per acre are the highest. Irrigation, in such cases is, the remaining factor that explains the mystery—irrigation, which brings to the barren soil, full of wonderful potentialities, water, that element which is to render it so marvelously productive.
