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PEOPLE AS LAW MAKERS How They Voted on Constitutional Amendments, Etc.

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION
For an amendment of section 28 (evidently intended to be section 29) of article IV of the constitution changing the compensation of members of the legislature to \$400 for each regular session and \$10 per day for each extra session instead of \$3 per day and mileage. (section 28 provides the time when laws take effect, and the proposed amendment is, therefore wrongly numbered.)
Yes 19,664; No 68,892

For an amendment of section 3 of article XIV of the constitution to permit the location of state institutions elsewhere than at the seat of government by act of the legislature and vote of the people. Yes, 41,975; No, 40,868.

An amendment to article VII of the constitution by increasing the number of Judges of the supreme court from three to five, until otherwise provided by law, and authorizing the legislative assembly to provide by appropriate legislation for the exercise by the circuit courts of the probate jurisdiction theretofore exercised by the county courts, and for the transaction of county business by and before some appropriate body or tribunal. Yes 30,243; No, 50,591.

For amendment of section 14 of article II of the constitution, changing the time of holding the regular general biennial elections from the first Monday in June to the first Tuesday after the First Monday in November. Yes 65,728; No 18,590.

REFERENDUM BY POPULAR PETITION.
An act providing that in all counties, the sheriff shall have the custody of prisoners committed to or confined in the county jail and such prisoners shall be worked at such places and for such time and in such manner as the county court may direct, and that in counties of over 100,000 inhabitants, the salaries of guards and jailors shall not exceed \$90 per month and the price of meals furnished prisoners shall be 12 cents each. Yes, 60,443; No, 30,033.

For an act requiring railroads and other common carriers to grant free transportation to state officers and county judges and sheriffs, as a condition precedent to acquiring land for corporate purposes by the exercise of eminent domain, and to prohibit the payment of mileage for such free transportation. Yes, 28,856; No, 59,405.

An act to appropriate \$25,000 annually for four years, to be used in purchasing grounds and building armories for the use of the Oregon national guard, the money to be expended under the supervision of the state military board at any time during the four years, the board not being required to use each appropriation the year it is appropriated. The Oregon national guard is required to pay to the state treasury such rental, for the use of said armories, as may be fixed by the state military board. Yes, 33,507; No, 54,848.

An act to amend sections 3529 of Bellingier & Cotton's annotated codes statutes of Oregon by increasing the annual appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon. Yes, 44,115; No, 40,555.

BY INITIATIVE PETITION
For equal suffrage constitutional amendment, permitting women to vote on equal terms with men. Yes, 36,358; No, 58,670.

For an act prohibiting fishing for salmon or sturgeon on Sunday from January 1 to October 1, also in the Columbia river only from October 1 to December 31, also in the navigable channels of Columbia river at night, also at any time in Sandy river and in Columbia river west of west line of range west near Astoria, and east of west line of range 16 east, near Celilo, and limiting seasons anywhere in the state to 150 fathoms long and four and one sixth fathoms deep, and providing penalties. Yes, 46,582; No, 40,720.

For constitutional amendment, giving additional and exclusive power to cities and towns, within their corporate limits, to license, regulate, control, and tax, or to suppress or prohibit theaters, race tracks, pool rooms, bowling alleys, billiard halls and the sale of liquors, subject to the provisions of the local option law of the state of Oregon. Yes, 39,442; No, 52,346.

For constitutional amendment providing that all dwelling houses, barns, sheds, outhouses and all other appurtenances thereto, all machinery and buildings used exclusively for manufacturing purposes and appurtenances thereto; all fences, farm machinery and appliances used as such; all fruit trees, vines, shrubs and all other improvements on farms; all livestock, all household furniture in use, and all tools owned by workmen and in use shall be exempt from taxation in addition to exemptions now authorized by the constitution. Yes, 32,066; No, 60,871.

For an amendment to article II of the constitution, giving the voters power to call a special election at any time to discharge any public officer and elect his successor. Yes, 58,381; No, 30,002.

A bill for a law instruction members of the legislature to vote for and elect the candidates for United States senator who receive the highest number of votes at the general election. Yes, 69,66. No, 21,162

For constitutional amendment giving the people power to make laws for election of public officers by majority vote instead of pluralities; to provide that political parties and voters organizations shall be proportionally represented in all officers filled by the election of two or more persons, and that a voter shall vote for only one person for any office, and may indicate his second, third etc., choice; and to provide for a simple method of precinct residence and registration. Yes, 48,868; No, 34,128.

A bill for a law to limit the amount of money candidates and other persons may contribute to spend in election campaigns; declaring what shall constitute corrupting use of money and undue influence in elections and punishing the same; prohibiting attempts on election day to persuade any voter to vote for or against any candidate or candidates or any measure submitted to the people; protect the purity of the ballot; furnishing information to voters concerning candidates and parties, partly at public expense, and providing for the manner of conducting election contests. Yes 54,042; No, 31,301.

For an act prohibiting, after August 25, 1908, fishing for salmon or sturgeon at any time, by any means, except hook and line, in the Sandy river or any of its tributaries at any place up stream from its confluence with the Sandy river or with hook and line during the spawning season. Yes, 56,130; No, 30,280.

For constitutional amendment providing for the choosing of jurors and grand jurors, and that no person can be charged in the circuit court with the commission of a crime or a misdemeanor except upon indictment found by a grand jury, except when a court holds an indictment to be defective, the district attorney may file an amended indictment. Yes, 52,214; No, 28,487.

A bill for an act to create the county of Hood River out of the western portion of Wasco county; providing for its organization and fixing the salaries of the officers thereof. Yes, 43,948; No, 26,778.

Portland, July 4.—With a verdict of "not guilty" to the charge of bribery against James Henry Booth, the Government this morning lost the first of the land-fraud cases brought in Oregon through Francis J. Heney. This verdict was returned at 9:15 this morning after the jury had been out since 6 o'clock last evening.

A. T. Train, the poultryman, who lives east of this city, received a dispatch last Friday night stating that his son, Thomas Shepard Train, aged 18, was killed in a wreck at Chadron, Neb. Mr. Train has not yet learned all the particulars, but think that there is no question but that the news is true. The last he knew of his son he was at Spokane, but he had undoubtedly left for trip east. He thinks he must have been identified by a letter on his person, as he and his brother had been in correspondence and the names in the dispatch were correct. Mr. Train wired friends at Rapid City, S. D., to take care of the body and see that his son had worthy interment and the burial will be held probably either at Chadron or Rapid City. The Portland Telegram gave a brief account of accident, but no names. The account showed that the wreck was caused by a cloud burst, there being five killed—the engineer, fireman, brakeman and two passengers; two others were reported missing. Thomas was the second son of Mr. Train and known to many people of Myrtle Point. The father has the sympathy of all his friends in his loss.—E. T. Cooper.
