

THE GLORIOUS FOURTH
Coquille Celebrates Our
National Holiday in
Grand Style.

Last Saturday witnessed what was evidently the largest crowd ever assembled in Coquille, and some think, in the county. It cannot be said of the people of Coos county that they are forgetting the birth of our Country or losing interest in the day we celebrate. The weather was ideal, everybody good natured and all the details of the program carried out in due form.

The people began to arrive in town from all directions at an early hour by wagons, and on schedule time the steamers began to arrive, three coming from Bandon and way points and one from the upper river, all carrying as many as they are allowed, and when the train pulled, in from Marshfield it carried five cars filled to their utmost capacity, making in all, with our town's people out, what was conservatively estimated at from three to four thousand people.

Promptly at the appointed time the parade was formed and circling around three blocks halted at the Collier Myrtle grove near the depot which had been arranged for the occasion, the procession being headed by one division of the band while the other brought up the rear, and was led by Marshal of the day, C. M. Skeels.

After these exercises the barbecue dinner was enjoyed. During the forenoon a ball game between North Bend and Bandon nines was enjoyed by a large crowd and was won by Bandon, and in the afternoon Coquille and Marshfield crossed bats, the home team carrying away the laurels.
