A Helming Fatally Shot.

On Saturday afternoon August Helming, a resident of Marshfield, was shot and instantly killed by a friend, Harley A. Reynolds, with whom he was hunting on Bald Mountain, Curry county. It appears that they were within a few feet of each other, and were expecting some deer to appear in an opening on the mountain below them. Mr. Helming was in front and told his friend to make ready. As the cartridge was placed in the chamber of his rifle he advanced and in changing his position brought the muzzle of the gun toward his companion when by accident he touched the trigger and the weapon was discharged, the ball striking Mr. Helming in the back, passing clear through the body. With the words "O God", he sank to the ground and passed away in a moment.

Mr. Reynolds is grief stricken to almost madness.

The body was carried out to the roads on horseback, and was brought to Bandon at 6 a. m. Monday morning, and was there prepared for burial, and reached here yesterday evening, and taken to Marshfield today, the place of interment.

The party of hunters consisted of the deceased and his wife, Geo. Baines and wife and Mr. Reynolds.
