#### Coquille Hatchery

We give below a portion of a letter from Fish Warden H. C. McAllister to T. A. Walker, of this city, which is self explanatory. We are pleased to see a hatchery established on the Coquille, as there is a large area of feeding grounds for salmon after they reach the age at which they are able to make their way to the sea and take care of themselves. The excerpt reads as follows:

I visited your city, in company with Frank W. Smith, Superintendent of the South Coos River Hatchery, last Monday, and whilst there, tried to see you but found that you were out of the city. Mr. Smith and I made a trip to the East Fork of the Coquille River with a view of racking same at its mouth, our object being to divert all the fish up the North Fork to our hatchery station. Mr. Smith, no doubt, has begun work on this rack before this time, and during the coming season we expect to operate our station on the Coquille instead of transferring eggs from the hatchery on the South Coos River. If the eggs taken on the Coquille this year justifies, I intend to erect a permanent plant next season. I am thoroughly convinced that the Coquille needs looking after and trust our work this season will be successful.
