New Road Building

Considerable new road building is under way in the South Fork section, and with its completion there will be some bad places in winter months avoided by the traveling public. One new stretch of highway upon which a crew is engaged will extend from the foot of the Johnson hill, across the river from the W. T. Dement place to a point about opposite the Massey place, a distance of one mile. The crew of workers is camped in the timbered bottom, where the old road to be avoided is located, and in which there is a sea of almost fathomless mud during the rainy season. The new road is being excavated from the hillsides above.

Another piece of needed new highway has been begun further up the South Fork, a mile beyond Etelka post office. This will be two miles in length, and involves the construction of a bridge over Yellow creek, having an 84-foot span. The contract is one of two secured last spring from the county by Stemmler & Minard of Myrtle Point, and it will afford the means of traveling on the north side of the stream without the necessity of crossing to the south side during high water. The other contract obtained by Stemmler & Minard was completed, a short piece of road near Bridge on the Middle Fork.

Coal Claims Contested

The coal claims located by different parties in extreme southern Coos county, on the South Fork of the Coquille river, have been contested by the U. S. Government, and the result of the proceedings is anxiously awaited, particularly by those most directly concerned. The claims, a quarter section in each, were taken up under the coal land act by Herbert Lockhart and wife and J. H. Flanagan, all of Marshfield, Cecil C. Carter and his wife, Alta E. Carter, of Rowland Prairie, and Samuel D. Pulford of Myrtle Point. The parties allege that the land is more valuable for its coal deposits than for its timber, stone or agricultural qualities, and on this contention the government now takes issue. The persons enumerated were cited for a hearing before U. S. Commissioner Liljeqvist at Marshfield last week, at which attorneys for the government will be present.

As it is Done Over Line

County Clerk Neilson during the first three weeks of the present fiscal year commencing July 1 issued 1240 hunter's licenses to residents of Siskiyou county at \$1 each, one \$10 license to a resident of the state outside of the county, and three \$25 licenses to non-residents of the state, making a total of \$1325. The revenue from this source in Siskiyou county promises to be greater than last year when it reached about \$3,000. The county gets none of this money, although it entails a great deal of extra labor on the county clerk and necessitates the employment of an extra deputy during several weeks. It all goes to the state game commission.

Mrs. S. A. Yoakam, County Dairy Inspector, was called to the river this week to investigate a little carelessness or negligence on the part of parties conducting dairy farms, and will insist that their places are put in a more cleanly and sanitary condition. She is also looking up exhibits for the district fair which is to take place at Marshfield on the 26th, 27th, 28th, and 29th, of this month. Mrs. Yoakam has promises of a goodly number of exhibits. In case the farmers of Coos county take the interest in this fair they should, it will be worth going to see, and will be a credit to the growers of the products, but it is easy to let opportunities go by and allow others to win the prizes.
