Railroads Win Victory.

Philadelphia, Sept. 10.—The commodities clause of the Hepburn railroad act today was declared unconstitutional by the United States circuit court for the eastern district of Pennsylvania.

The clause provides after May, 1908, it would be unlawful for any railroad company to transport from one state to another or to any foreign country, any article or commodity manufactured, mined or produced by it, under its authority, directly or indirectly, except such articles or commodities as may be necessary for its use in the conduct of its business as a common carrier. The clause exempts lumber, and its manufactured products, and is aimed particularly at railroads owning coal mines.
