Confirmation Services.

Bishop Scadding has been making his yearly visitations to the parishes and missions of the more remote portions of his diocese. He came to Coquille from Marshfield on Saturday, September 26th, and on the Sunday following held two services in St. James mission; the confirmation services, when four candidates presented themselves to receive the sacred rites, being held in the morning, followed by the administering of the holy communion. A large congregation was present in the evening and followed attentively the interesting discourse of the bishop. The Coos [Bay Times says:
