**Apple Crop Moving.**

The first big sale of the Oregon apple is reported from Hood River. The sale was made to J. H. Steinhart of Steinhart & Kelly, of New York City. In many respects this is the most important sale made in the Northwest this year. In fact it is the first outright sale as the others have been on a consignment basis.

Indications so far in the apple market have been rather dull tone and the Hood River Association has in course of erection a large cold storage plant, that they may be enabled to hold their fruit and not be compelled to ship as soon as packed. It has been their custom in the past to advertise their fruit for sale and receive sealed bids for same. This year, however, owing to the greatly increased crop they have decided not to do this for the present at least, and made this sale outright.

This opening sale is indicative of an early movement of the fruit and while the price is not given out, the managers say that it is in every way satisfactory. The sale includes Newtown Pippins, Northern Spies, Arkansas Blacks, 4 1/2 tier Spitzenbergs 4 1/2 tier Baldwins five cars 4 tier Baldwins and two cars Jonathans approximating 80,000 boxes. This firm for a number of years have been handling the Hood River product, purchasing it from the firm who had secured the entire crop. This is the first purchase from the association.

This still leaves about 150,000 boxes to be disposed of, but the break into the market is indicative of the fact that the East still wants excellent fruit, and other dealers will doubtless desire to at once to secure their supplies.—Oregon Agriculturist.

Advices received at the local signal office at Seattle show that the signal service wireless stations in Alaska have made another record, removing all doubt as to the feasibility of ending wireless messages overland. Fort Gibbon, at the junction of the Tanana and Yukon rivers, several hundred miles inland is receiving messages from Nome and St. Michael, 500 miles distant, with many ranges of hills between the two stations. A message sent by the steamer Northwestern, 1100 miles west of Cape Flattery, to the United Wireless station at Cordova, was copied. The message traveled about 1200 miles in an air line over two high ranges of mountains capped with snow.—Ex.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 29.—Is a goat a disease or a crime?

This question is agitating the hitherto peaceful atmosphere of St. St. Louis and has caused Sheriff Hines to call for an official opinion from the county prosecutor. Mart Hutchins, who lives in Roosevelt addition, has put the question squarely to the sheriff.

A tramp goat of uncertain parentage and uncertain ownership has been pillaging the Hutchins' truck garden. He decided to cut short the mortal career of Mr. Goat, but was apprehended on the charge of shooting in the city limits. He missed the goat.

Hutchins then demanded official action against the goat. Sheriff Hines said the matter should be handled by the county physician, as the goat could only be prosecuted under the nuisance act relative to things inimical to public health.

The county physician said the goat was clearly not a disease, but a crime, and properly in the sheriff's jurisdiction.

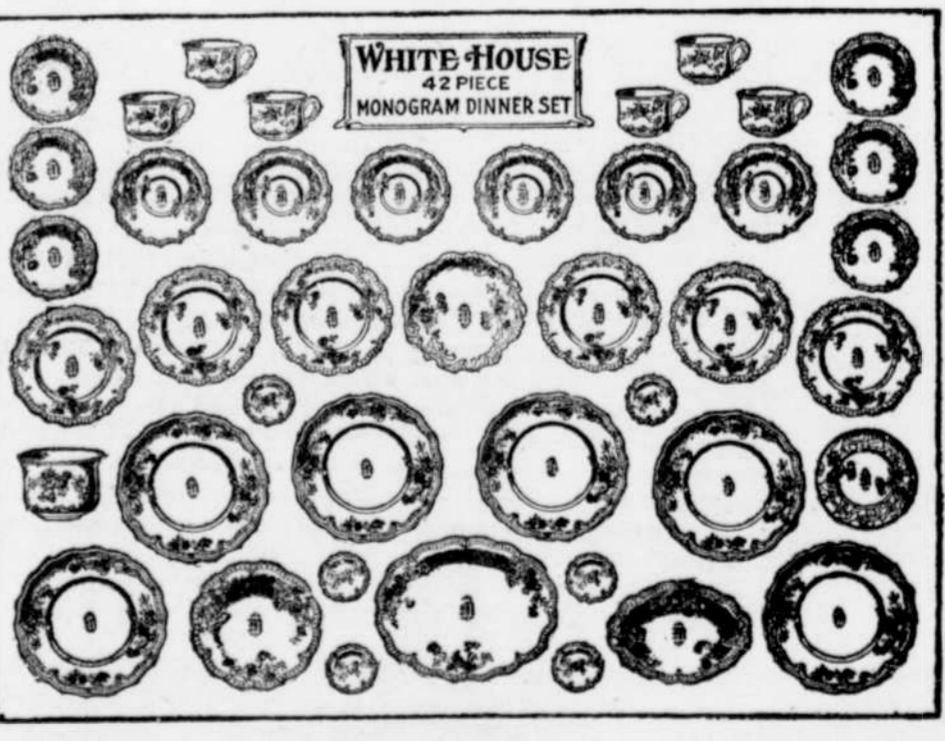
