"Jason Joskins, or a jay in New York," while it has a plot containing some of the usual elements of melodrama, is more in the way of a vehicle for a great deal of very enjoyable comedy.

Pansy runs away and disguises herself as a newsboy. Her friend Dan Kelly is a detective, and between them they plot to circumvent Grepps. Jason Joskins on his visit to New York runs up against all of these characters. He is buncoed out of \$20 by Grepps and his confederate, Ben Holtz, and he discovers in Pansy his own grand daughter. He takes her back to his home where more comedy is seen in the successful endeavor of Jason's housekeeper, Jane Ann, to get him to propose. Mr. Meade plays Jason Joskins, which is a guarantee that the mirth-provoking capabilities of the part will be fully brought out, and no one who likes a good laugh should miss this performance.
