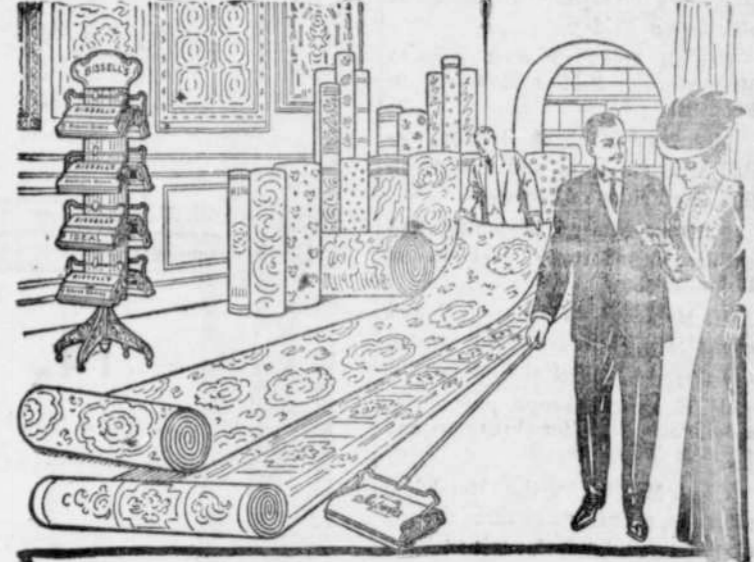
There will be a whist tournament at the Masonic Hall next Monday evening November 30th. All whist players are invited to be present and enjoy a pleasant evening.
