### The Basket Ball Contests.

The boys' high school basket ball team, accompanied by many pupils and several of the teachers and Mr. Knowlton, went in Myrtle Point on Wednesday evening Nov. 25 to meet the high school of that place in a game of ball. The Wolverines, having been chartered for the occasion, set sail about 4:15 arriving at Myrtle Point about 6:30. A large crowd assembled in the Herman hall to witness the game. The game was called a little after 8:00. The Myrtle Point boys played to fast for the Coquille boys and the first half ended with a score of 17 to 8 in favor of the Myrtle Point boys. The Coquille boys played better the second half and the game closed with a score of 28 to 20 in favor of Myrtle Point. The weakness of the Coquille boys lay in throwing of baskets. Realizing this fact the boys spent some time Thursday and Friday trying to overcome their failing.

On Friday evening the sound of hoofs, the clatter of wheels, and the chugging of a launch gave evidence of the approach of the Myrtle Pointers with a boys' and a girls' team. The Athletic Club had arranged with the Wickham hotel for supper for the visiting team a room for the ladies. At 8:15 p. m. the game was called and the boys appeared on the floor for the first half. The Myrtle Pointers put up a lively game again and won out on the first half by a score of 12 to 8. The girls then played a 30 minute half which was enjoyed by the crowd, the result being in favor of the Coquille girls. The boys second half was played with much vigor resulting in a score of 29 to 21 in favor of Coquille. The girls second half lasted but ten minutes as the playing time for the girls is but 30 minutes. The Myrtle Point girls played a good game in the second half and caused the Coquille girls to see that they had something to play with. The resulting score was 33 to 10 in favor of Coquille. The Myrtle Point girls were not in readiness to play a public game but by urgent request kindly consented to come in order that interest might be stimulated. In all both games were interesting to the public.

### Cody Mill Running.

The Cody mill is now running at full blast, and the welcome echo of its penetrating whistle is heard to reverberate through the hills several times a day, but the best noise of all is the clanging of the great band saw as it goes ripping through the logs, tearing off the lumber for foreign and domestic trade. The mill started up last Thursday, but it was not put into full operation until this week. The capacity of the Cody mill is about 100,000 feet a day, which will be sufficient to keep a large boat busy hauling lumber to San Francisco and have a margin to spare. The Lyons-Johnson mill will also soon be in operation with a capacity of 50,000 feet, and the two mills can easily keep two boats going.

It is probable that the Fifield and the Bandon will both be on regular runs between here and San Francisco, and a number of tramp sail schooners will also come into the river. The new pile jetty is putting the bar into a condition that most any kind of a vessel will be enabled to come in.—Recorder.

According to the Morning Oregonian, Secretary of State Benson may find it necessary to send a messenger to Gold Beach to ascertain the official vote of Curry county as cast at the recent election. No report of the vote in that county had been received at Salem up to Nov. 24th, and when such a delay occurs the law gives the Secretary of State the right to send an emissary for the vote.

### R. D. Hume Passes Away.

After a lingering illness with kidney trouble, at one time during which he was thought to be convalescing, R. D. Hume, the widely known capitalist and salmon king of Rogue river, answered the final summons at Wedderburn early on the morning of Nov. 25th. His wife was with him when the end came, also Dr. Mingus of Marshfield who had been constantly at his bedside since the last illness began. Interment took place at Wedderburn on Friday afternoon, and many and profuse were the floral offerings and the sympathizing friends in attendance.

R. D. Hume's career was one of the most active and interesting of any millionaire in recent times. His large fortune had been chiefly amassed in the salmon packing business, engaging first in that calling on the Columbia river in the latter sixties, where he later sold out at a big profit and then began operations on Rogue river. Here at the time of his death he owned a large cannery and merchandising business besides 15,000 acres of land paying, it is said, one-sixth of all the taxes of Curry county. He also owned ocean craft and property in San Francisco and elsewhere.

Mr. Hume was a man of strong aggressiveness and likes and dislikes, and of course had his enemies as well as friends. He was also a politician of some force, and had represented this district in the Oregon Legislature. Only last spring he aspired to the State Senate as an Independent Republican, but went down to defeat before the regular ticket.

Deceased was of sturdy Scotch extraction. He was born in Maine on October 31, 1845, being therefore but 63 years of age. No relatives survive him save a widow and two nephews, his first wife and two sons, as also his brothers, having preceded him to the grave.

R. D. Hume, to be sure, will be sorely missed in the business circles of Southwestern Oregon and of Curry county in particular.
