Binger Hermann for Coquille.

The HERALD feels a sense of satisfaction at the action of the commercial bodies of this valley in sending Hon. Binger Hermann to lobby for the interests of Coquille river and bar before the present Rivers and Harbors Congress. Mr. Hermann as our former Congressman and as ex-Commissioner of the General Land Office should be in a position to wield very great influence at the national capital, which influence he certainly has wielded in the years that have passed. He goes as the special representative of Coquille Valley, with expenses defrayed by the people of Coquille Valley, and, though his work will be chiefly to secure recommendations for an appropriation for our river and bar, it is not to be expected or supposed that he will disregard or combat the wants of Coos Bay. This is said despite the assertion of the Coos Bay Times that he will represent "Coos Bay and the Coquille River." Our friends at the bay have named two delegates to the Congress in the persons of Walter Lyon and Peter Loggie, and they, with ex-Congressman Hermann and Orvil Dodge, also sent from this section, should make a very formidable lobby for the interests of both ends of growing Coos county.

Orvil Dodge was selected as assistant delegate from Southern Coos county subsequent to the selection of Binger Hermann, and part of his expenses was paid by the commercial bodies of Coquille, Bandon and Myrtle Point.

Anti-Statement Men Will.

Says the Portland Evening Telegram, (Republican), of Nov. 25th, which paper is advocating Governor Chamberlain for the U. S. Senate since the people have expressed a preference for him:

Discovering that the move was not popular, the people who proposed circulating petitions urging Statement No. 1 members of the Legislature to violate their pledge and not vote for George E. Chamberlain have abandoned the plan, at least temporarily. The petition blanks have been printed, but are not in circulation. The proposition did not meet with that degree of enthusiasm expected by the Antis, and there is a strong likelihood of the petitions finally being entirely abandoned.

Another reason why the petitions are not meeting with success is that the Antis have discovered the Statement men are rapidly coming to a realization of the political game the Antis were framing up, and that the Statement men are getting together to control the organization of both House and Senate. The agreement to stand together and support only a Statement man for Speaker is receiving many signatures, and several out-of-town Representatives have made special trips to Portland for the express purpose of signing it. From the way in which the agreement is now being signed there is every prospect for its success and a mutual understanding among the Statement men is being arrived at.

The petition to members to break their pledge to the people was expected to be the best method the opposition to Chamberlain could employ to defeat him. But it, too, is destined to be a disappointment.

That Attorney Ralph B. Fisher was murdered by James A. Finch in culmination of a conspiracy in which several persons were concerned, is the theory on which city detectives are working under direction of District Attorney Cameron. In fact it is admitted by Mr. Cameron that evidence has been discovered of a nature which may cause further arrests at any minute. Two days before he met his death at the hands of Finch, in conversation with a personal friend, Mr. Fisher used the following language: "I am well satisfied who has been writing me the letters telling me that I am in danger of being killed. As a matter of fact, I have almost evidence enough now to warrant me in proceeding against him, and if I succeed in finding out a thing or two more, which I need to make a complete case, I shall lay a complaint and have this fellow arrested."—Portland Telegram.

Unanimous for Tax.

At the meeting of electors of Coquille school district, held at the school house Saturday afternoon pursuant to the call of the Board, it was unanimously voted to levy an 8 mill tax for the purpose of defraying the cost of a full term of school. So much for the public interest of this district in its best educational advantages.

Mrs. C. A. Hanscom Dies

Mrs. C. A. Hanscom died at her home in Monroe, Wash., Dec. 5th, at the age of 64 years, 7 months and 17 days. Decedent with her husband lived for 30 years or more in Coos county, moving from here to Washington some five or six years ago. Mr. Hanscom was one of the first sheriffs of Coos county. The departed lady leaves several children, they being, besides two or three in Washington, as follows: Mrs. J. B. Pointer, Mrs. T. R. Pointer and Ed Cunningham of the Coquille vicinity, and Mrs. A. O. Wheeler of California. Interment took place at Monroe.

Brother Ends His Life.

James H. Goff, brother of S. M. Goff of Coquille, and a Deputy Assessor and prominent Republican politician of Humboldt county, California, committed suicide at the Grand Hotel in Eureka on Nov. 29. Particulars of the sad affair are not known in this place, but it is known that the deceased and his brothers were in litigation over the estate of their aged mother who died about two months ago, leaving the bulk of her property to James H. Goff. S. M. Goff, who is a member of the firm of Goff & Goodman in Coquille, left for Eureka about two weeks since to press his claim for a share of the estate.

Maybe an Electric Line.

A dispatch from Roseburg, dated Dec. 2d, says:

M. M. Johnson of Portland, assistant secretary of the Equitable Savings and Loan Association, and treasurer of the Columbia Life and Trust Company, is in Roseburg investigating the possibilities for the promotion of an electric railroad between Roseburg and Coos bay. Mr. Johnson has no plans outlined for such a project; to use his own language, he is merely "seeing what the possibilities are." He spent the day here interviewing leading merchants to get some idea of the quantity of business that could be assured for a railway between Roseburg and the bay. He also gathered such other data and information as he might require later on. Mr. Johnson leaves for Coos county tomorrow in furtherance of his mission.

City Dads Meet.

The City Council was in regular monthly session Monday evening, Mayor Hawkins and Councilmen Mansell, Nye, Moulton, Schroeder and Kerr being in attendance. Absent: Councilman Burkholder.

On motion, a tax levy of two and one-half mills was imposed to meet current expenses. The old ordinance relating to bowling alleys was amended so as to meet present requirements, such as midnight and Sunday closing, and the license was fixed at \$50 per year, the same as billiard halls. N. O. Lundson was granted a license to conduct a bowling alley.

Cognizance was taken of the growing spirit among our people to clean up their premises, and it was the sense of the Council to strengthen the ordinance compelling property owners to clean up.

The regular monthly claims were audited and allowed.

The petition of residents on the opposite side of the river for water supply from the municipal plant was referred to the water committee with full power to act. These residents, five in number and outside the limits, agree to pay one year's water rent in advance if the mains are simply laid across the stream, they to do their own piping and have house supply only.

Club met with Mrs. Nye on the afternoon of November 23th. The topic for day, "child-life in Holland" had been assigned to Mrs. Lawrence who had several interesting articles, after which general items of interest were given by various members of the club.

The meeting of Saturday last was held at the home of Mrs. Cope, the president Miss Lusk presenting a paper on "Dutch Universities and Charitable Institutions."
