Chamberlain Elected.

Salem, Or., Jan. 20.—Governor Chamberlain was formally elected United States senator at a joint session of both houses of the legislature today. Pursuant to an invitation, Governor Chamberlain later addressed the assembly, thanking the legislators, as representatives of the people, for the great honor conferred upon him. He called attention to the fact that Oregon leads all other states in the matter of people electing their own senators, and added:

"Let me say to you that I go to Washington as the representative of this magnificent commonwealth absolutely unfettered by any pledge to person or party. I go as the servant of all the people to do as God gives me light to see. My whole duty will be in furthering the moral, commercial and industrial interests of our state."

In the election of Governor Chamberlain as United States Senator, Senator Abraham and Representatives Jones stood by their Statement No. 1 pledges. Applegate and Buchanan cast their votes for Caka. Applegate made no comment, but Buchanan explained that his personal choice was Fulton, but that having promised to support the republican voters' choice he would vote for Caka.

James Keane Company.

Edmund Keane the advance agent of the James Keane Company arrived here yesterday from Marshfield and announced that he would play here tonight in Louis Roberts Stevenson great play Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. The entire Company arrived this morning and the hearty welcome accorded them by their friends is of sufficient evidence to establish the fact that the opera house will be crowded to the doors to-night. They regret very much having to overlook the Coquille country last week, and if it were not for the freshet that staved them in the face they would have been here. The houses in Marshfield and North Bend were sold out a week ahead and were in fear that if they made the trip to the Coquille country they would have been unable to play in Marshfield on last Friday and Saturday nights, and consequently were obliged to abandon the idea of coming here last week at the last moment. If our old friend Jim Keane disappointed the people here in not coming last week, he is forgiven for he never disappointed us in the three tours which he has made to Coos County in the class of plays and players that he has brought us. He always has given us the best that money could obtain and he proved this again when he produced Fabio Romani here two weeks ago. Now he comes with his greatest piece, his masterpiece "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde". He has played it for ten years. Up until two years ago there two men in the profession that staved in this play. One was Richard Mansfield and the other James Keane. Now Mansfield is dead, and Keane is the one man left to keep Stevensons great work of fiction alive. He has played it a dozen times in every important City in the United States. The people of Coquille will have an opportunity of seeing him in this play the first time in his tenth year of this great production. The seats were put on sale last evening at Knowltons.

Launch Upsets.

As the waters had submerged the railroad track at the junction and the train could not reach this place last Friday, Fred Kerrigan, of this city, went to meet a few persons who wished to come with his gasoline launch. He received word that there were but four, but on arrival at Coaledo he found seven waiting for him, which made rather a larger load than he should carry in so small a craft. All went well through the big marsh, but when near the mouth of Beaver slough in the orchard at J. B. R. Shelton's, for some reason the boat reeled and began to fill. Some think the bottom of the boat came in contact with a log while others say one of the passengers caught hold of an apple tree limb which caused the boat to rock. At any rate the passengers were precipitated into the water and got a cold bath and some of a scare if nothing more.

The persons on board were J. S. Lawrence, of Coquille, C. H. Pullen, of Bandon, Mrs. Lynch who was just arriving here to locate, W. M. VanDecar, of Bandon, and two strangers who were passing through, and Fred Kerrigan and Will McLeod in charge of the boat. Mr. Lawrence and Mrs. Lynch were the last to get out of the cabin, making their exit through a window, the later being taken out last in an unconscious condition. Some of the parties clung to apple trees and others to boom poles while some stayed with the boat till Mr. Shulton, who was only a few rods away in a small boat, came to their assistance and conveyed them to a safe place where they awaited the arrival of the Dispatch when they came on to town. This shows how easily these small launches may be overloaded and what might happen if such an accident should occur in deep water on strong currents.

John F. Hamblock Dies.

On Sunday afternoon John F. Hamblock, a well known pioneer citizen, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. T. W. Drane, near Parkersburg. The deceased would have been 77 years of age in June, and has lived in Coos county thirty-nine years. He was preceded to the great beyond by his wife, but leaves two sons and three daughters to mourn his departure, as follows: Messrs. J. V. and Eugene Hamblock, and Mrs. Ed Rose, Mrs. Joe Flam and Mrs. T. W. Drane, beside a large number of friends and acquaintances throughout the county.

On Thursday of last week as the water stood several feet deep about the foundation of the new trestle just completed under the direction of John Tawse for the Riverton Coal Co., and during the hardest windstorm this section has experienced for years, the structure gave way and toppled over and will cause a great delay in operations and a considerable loss to the company. The trestle was about 1500 feet long and ranged from 32 to 42 feet in height, and was fully completed with the iron rails, deck and all ready for use. This will no doubt delay matters till well along in the spring, giving time to reconstruct the trestle after the waters have subsided.

Rather Rough Enjoyment.

Ed C. Barker and Eugene Wickham chose a novel way of whiling the time last Sunday, and had a rough experience if it was enjoyable. Early in the forenoon, or at about 8 o'clock, they secured a horse apiece and sat out through the storm-swept country. Everywhere was mud-bottomless mud-and the swollen streams seemed to challenge their further progress, but they were not to be discouraged or deterred from their nerva-trying object.

The two travelers went first to the mouth of the North Fork, this side of Myrtle Point. Then up that stream they rode as far as Gravel Ford, where they halted for rest and to partake of a splendid chicken dinner with Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Bennett. Dinner over, they remounted and continued up the North Fork as far as Fox bridge, where they turned and took the old road over Shuck Hill to the Norway school house. Thence to Coquille was the ride of but an hour, slush and water sounting for naught, and the entire trip of 34 miles was covered in exactly nine hours, including the stop at Mr. Bennett's.

Mr. Barker states that in places it was impossible to get along without leaving the road for a quarter of a mile or more, and then often leading their horses through the thickets. Parties told them at one point they could not make the journey. They did make it, and then told other enquirers that these could not cover the ground they did. The roads around Gravel Ford are being made about as good as conditions will permit just now.
