Mr. Larsen with his dredge has gone through the high river bank and is out near the low portion of the Beaver Slough marsh with the big ditch near the mouth of Beaver slough. The late rises in the river demonstrated fully the effect which this ditch will have on that large body of land, at this time of year covered with water. During the rise of the river the current was so strong toward the marsh that Mr. Larsen found it difficult to hold his dredge in the channel it had made, and when the stream began to fall, it was the same way toward the river, which kept the marsh even with the river. This shows that as soon as the river goes down to tide water, the marsh will almost be dry and that feed will grow and cattle be able to reach it at once when the high waters cease in the spring, instead of standing a deep body of water over hundreds of acres till late in the season, the principal part of which escapes by evaporation.
