### Will Be Tried Soon.

Washington, March 24.—Binger Hermann, J. N. Williamson and other Oregon men who have long rested under indictment, some for more than four years, will be given a speedy trial or else the indictments against them will be dismissed.

Attorney-General Wickersham has learned of the manner in which the trial of these cases has been stayed of from time to time, and has given orders that such proceedings will no longer be tolerated. These defendants under the Constitution are guaranteed a speedy trial, and if the government after all this time is unable to place them on trial other steps will be taken to close the cases.

There is no disposition to longer postpone these trials to suit the convenience of any one connected with the prosecution, and it is therefore improbable that the Hermann case, if dropped, will be turned over to some other than Heney for prosecution.

### Hume's Property to be Sold.

Gold Beach, Or., March 24. The property of the late R. D. Hume in Curry county has been appraised at \$375,000. Mr. Hume left very little money at his death, and to carry out the bequests of his will the property must be sold.

It is stated the fishery owned by the dead salmon king will not be operated this year. In fact, it is currently reported the value of this property depreciated 50 per cent at Mr. Hume's death.

### Railroad From Coos Bay.

Tacoma, Wash., March 25.—Articles of incorporation have just been filed here by the Pacific Oregon Railway Navigation Company, which is thought to be backed by Hill. The articles state that railroads are to be built in Oregon, Idaho and California and steamers are to be operated between San Francisco and Tacoma and other points. The promoters declare one of the first steps will be the construction of a railroad from Coos Bay, Oregon, 160 miles inland, tapping the rich farming, fruit growing and timbered districts. A. E. Law, one of the incorporators, was for many years a leading official of the Northern Pacific.

### Bandon Mill Resumes Work.

Bandon, Or., March 23.—The mill of the Cody Lumber Company, which has been shut down for a few weeks, undergoing extensive repairs started up this morning, and will continue to run at full blast. The capacity of this mill is 100,000 feet in ten hours, and there is a great probability that it will be operated day and night in the near future, as the demand for lumber in the San Francisco market is growing all the time.

The steamers Bandon and Fifeild, property of the A. F. Estabrook Company, have been carrying the lumber for this and the Lyons-Johnson mill, which is also located at this city. C. W. Burgess, a capitalist, of San Francisco, has recently purchased a large interest in the Estabrook Company, and he is here now, looking over the situation. Both men are much pleased with the outlook for business. Bandon and the Coquille River are in the height of prosperous conditions.

### Another Old Pioneer Dead.

Postmaster Robert Walker Bandon, a native of Ontario, Can., born April 17, 1844, a veteran of the Civil War, prominent Mason, for two terms sheriff of Curry county, and many years Chairman Republican County Central Committee in Coos, sometime member of the State Board of Equalization and for eight years postmaster at Bandon, died this morning at an early hour at his home in Bandon.

Deceased is survived by his wife Mary E. Walker, two sons Harry and Robert and three daughters, Misses Mae and Pearl and Mrs. G. T. Trendgold, all of Bandon.

Mr. Walker had been recently re-appointed postmaster for the ensuing four years.

Death was due to complications of a growth in the abdominal cavity. The funeral was held today at 2:00 p. m.

### Chamber of Commerce Meets.

Coquille Chamber of Commerce met in regular session on Wednesday evening with President Sperry presiding. Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved. Communications were read and bills allowed. The report of the treasurer was read and approved.

The following resolution was offered by Mr. Sherwood and was adopted and ordered spread on the minutes:

Resolved, that we, the Coquille Chamber of Commerce, express our high appreciation of the very efficient mail service that the people of Coquille and vicinity have enjoyed during the winter of 1908 and 1909. While the mail has been two or three hours late on very few days, but only one day all winter long has the mail failed to arrive, and this we are told was due to a slide. We desire to take this means of commending not only the management of this mail service, but also the carriers who have brought the mail over the Camas Valley, Middle Fork and Myrtle Point route.

The Good Roads question was discussed at length by the members present and it was decided to communicate with the various commercial bodies of this and Douglas counties regarding the matter of improving the wagon road between here and Roseburg. The consensus of opinion was that, though we cannot build a railroad, we can construct and maintain a good wagon road to the outside and if the citizens of the county can get together and work as a unit the road can and will be repaired and put in a condition to make it possible to drive over it at any time of the year in perfect safety and with a certain amount of dispatch.

The following resolution was also offered and adopted:

Resolved, that we, the Coquille Chamber of Commerce, emphatically declare ourselves in favor of a first-class wagon road to Roseburg. We believe that all the people in Coos county should unite in the construction of one good wagon road that can be traveled all seasons of the year. Coos county can and should build a wagon road.

Resolved, that we invite the cooperation of the commercial bodies of Coos and Douglas counties, having in view a first class wagon road from Coos county to Roseburg. Nothing further coming before the body it stood adjourned to meet in regular session Wednesday, April 17.

### Poultry Callings.

There is no feed better adapted for the evening meal than corn. Roosts should only be a foot from the ground. Charcoal is excellent for indigestion if mixed with the soft food. A fowl inclined to fatten too readily is not as a rule a prolific layer.

You can nearly always depend on the hardness of fowls that fatten slowly.

It is a waste of time and money to keep, feed, and care for poor or indifferent fowls.

In feeding young chickens almost anything that is clean, wholesome and sweet will not be out of place.

As a rule cockerels from a sire having long legs are apt to be stilted and do not put on flesh kindly.

Bone when crushed or ground supplies a value peculiar to itself, and all kinds of poultry are extremely fond of it.

Corn when fed to the hen by itself has a tendency to fatten rather than produce the most profitable egg laying.

Sand is not a substitute for gravel in the poultry yard. The hens usually pick up the sharpest and most irregular pieces.

When chicks have perfect freedom they find whatever the system carves and what instinct teaches them they need, to a certain extent.

Young ducklings will thrive wonderfully on bran and cornmeal of equal parts made into a mush with scalding water or warm milk.

There is no difficulty in raising young ducks or goslings, provided they are kept dry and are not allowed near water until reasonably well feathered.

The flock of hens that keep busy scratching do not contract the vices peculiar to those fowls that have nothing to do, and they keep fresh and in good health.

### Bridge Items.

The crops and gardens are nearly all planted in this section.

Mrs. Robertson of Eastern Oregon is visiting her sister, Mrs. E. J. Allen.

Fifty pupils were at Bible School, Sunday, to try out new song books.

R. C. Endicott moved his family to Bridge one day last week.

Lyle Nosler, son of C. H. Nosler, met with a serious accident last week. His skull was fractured by the kick of a horse, but he is recovering rapidly. Dr. Stenlmer dressed the wound.

The panthers are getting unusually bold on Myrtle Creek. Four have been killed there during the last ten days. One took sheep from a corral that was less than fifty yards from Mr. Price's residence.

Mrs. C. E. Houser, who has been very ill in Myrtle Point for the past few months, is slightly improved. She and her daughter Josie moved into H. Hatcher's cottage at Bridge recently.

Mr. Jefferies and family, late of Hillsboro, were in Bridge, Friday night. They were enroute to their homestead on Sandy Creek, near Remote. Mr. Jefferies is to have the largest and best furnished log house in Coos county.

There is much talk of combining the Bridge and King creek schools, building another room onto the Bridge school house, and adding a ninth grade. Likely an eight months term of school next year.

The big Creek public school, Miss Ellingsen, teacher, gave an entertainment and basket social, Saturday, at the Bridge Hall. The proceeds twenty six dollars, is to purchase a new flag and start a school library. The program was excellent, and the baskets went so high that the boys will have to trap some wild cats before another social is given. And if you need an auctioneer, address Woodruff, Bridge.

Why this talk in one of the Bay papers of taking off the county scalp bounty? Do many of the taxpayers want it removed? Did not the taxpayers petition for the county bounty? We pay large sums every year for the protection of our game (little value), while it is conceded by all hunters and people having an opportunity to know the facts, that the reason our game is getting so scarce is on account of the slaughter by panther and cats.

If a poor hunter kills one deer out of season, he is charged from \$25 to \$50. But a panther, which (estimated) kills from fifty to one hundred and fifty deer annually is not worth \$20. Why is one deer worth so much in the first instance, and one hundred and fifty of so little value in the second?

If each man were allowed to kill all of the deer he wished for his own use, still the slaughter would be many times less than that the panther and cats annually destroy.

Would it not be better to spend a little less on game warden's, that protect very little, and pay a little more for scalps and strike at the root of the slaughter?

Losses from salmon, and time and pains necessary to train, make good varmint dogs very expensive. But since the bounty law has been in effect many are improving their dogs. During the last year twenty panthers and more than thirty cats have been killed in the vicinity of Bridge. At least one thousand deer saved.

And the loss of stock is increasing as the game decreases. At least twenty five sheep and half as many goats, besides many lambs have been lost in our section recently.

Better put more bounty on coyotes (state is \$1.50) many people think, so as to give a strong incentive for their extermination while few in number.

The framers of our state bounty laws made it necessary to remove scalps from all skins, making hides practically worthless.

Do you wonder why most ranches want the county bounty law.

Leave the county bounty as it is say the people of Bridge.
