## Our Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 15.  
Congress assembled today in re-  
sponse to a special call of Presi-  
dent Taft, in conformity with the  
promise that he made to the people  
of this country last fall.

President Taft promised that, if  
elected, he would immediately call  
Congress together to revise the tar-  
iff that the revision should be hon-  
estly and fearlessly made. Every-  
one knows but for his promise,  
backed by his well known sincerity  
Bryan and the Democratic party  
would have been swept into power  
on a tidal wave. The excessively  
protected industries are now hard  
at work trying to convince Congress  
that this promise of Mr. Taft was  
only a bluff. These industries have  
been enjoying a degree of protec-  
tion much higher than was necessary  
to insure a fair profit to the man-  
ufacturer and fair wages to every  
workman. The steel trust, for in-  
stance, has made annually \$400,000,  
000 more than a fair profit on the  
money invested. They have been  
selling steel rails to the American  
people for \$28 per ton and selling  
those same rails delivered in London  
and other European centers at \$22  
to \$24 per ton. It is obvious that  
the American tariff is not necessary  
to the American manufacturer when  
he goes in all foreign fields. If he  
can sell in the markets where com-  
petition is strong without the aid of  
protection, why should he be given  
a tariff that is nothing more than a  
license to rob the American people.

Every railroad that is built, every  
bridge that is built, every house  
with iron girders that is erected,  
must pay tribute to this great trust.  
In other words, there is a tax of  
\$400,000,000 every year on the  
prosperity of this country that is  
paid to the steel trust so that if this  
tariff were removed, instead of mak-  
ing the steel trust a present of \$400,  
000,000 a year, that money would  
start new enterprises and industries  
which would greatly aid our prop-  
erty. President Taft promised  
that the tariff shall be adjusted so  
as to give a fair return to the man-  
ufacturer on the money invested  
and fair wages to the workmen they  
employ. The American people  
heartily endorse this position and  
Congress is expected to carry this  
promise into effect.

There is one great difficulty in  
the way however, and that is  
Speaker Cannon; it is well known  
that he stands for an excessive and  
practically exorbitant tariff and  
he has been a thorn in the side of  
President Roosevelt and bids fair  
to be a burden on the hands of  
President Taft. It is a misfortune  
that this old fogey, nearly eighty  
years old, should preside over con-  
gress in these progressive times.

The Republican majority in con-  
gress has steadily decreased under  
his leadership until now the major-  
ity is but one-third of what it was  
four years ago when Republican  
victories have otherwise been  
practically as overwhelming. It is  
well known on inside circles that  
President Taft would welcome a  
new progressive speaker in the  
place of Mr. Cannon who has be-  
come a liability rather than an as-  
set of the Republican party. The  
farmers of this country have great  
confidence in President Taft and  
they expect a substantial reduction  
in the tariff all along the line which  
will give them relief from the cor-  
dage trust, the wire nail trust, the  
harvester trust, the farming im-  
plement trust and every other  
trust that derives nourishment and  
power from this excessively high  
tariff. Every man who stands in  
the way of an honest and fair re-  
duction of the tariff, is working  
against the Republicans and for a  
sweeping Democratic victory in the  
next congressional election.
