Crushed by Swinging Log.

Frank Burns of North Bend, died at Mercy hospital in North Bend yesterday afternoon from injuries sustained at the Vaughn & McDonald logging camp on Coos River yesterday morning. A large log which he was steering unexpectedly turned from the line that it was to run catching Burns and crushing him horribly. Both legs were broken, his head crushed and his body badly crushed. He was quickly brought to the hospital to be cared for but his injuries proved fatal shortly after reaching there. Burns was about twenty-two years old. A brother, George Burns, and a sister, Miss Lizzie Burns, reside in North Bend. Another sister, Mrs. Reynolds, moved to North Bend a short time ago from California. The funeral will probably be held Sunday.

Sail Boat Upsets on Coos Bay.

John L. Brown of Jordon's Cove and a stranger, recently from the East, whose name is thought to be Hensen, were rescued from a probable watery grave in the Bay near North Bend shortly after noon today by H. B. Fulton, Henry Wickham and C. M. Byler. The two were out for a sail when their boat, either through mismanagement or from a sudden gust of wind upset, throwing them into the Bay.

The upsetting of the boat was witnessed by Miss Maude Coke who happened to be looking out of the window of the R. J. Coke home which overlooks the Bay. She saw the men struggling and realized that they were in serious danger. A telephone message to her father at the Coos Bay Grocery told of the men's predicament. H. B. Fulton who runs the "Rosebud" on Haynes Inlet, accompanied by Messrs. Byler and Wickham made a dash for the scene. When they reached the overturned boat, they found the two occupants clinging to the side badly chilled and scarcely able to move. Hansen was quickly taken on board the Rosebud but when it came to taking Brown on board, it was found that his feet were so entangled in the ropes of the overturned sail boat that the ropes had to be cut away. He would never have been able to free himself and surely must have drowned had not assistance reached them promptly. —Coos Bay Times.

City Grants Franchise.

On Wednesday evening of last week a special session of our city council was called at the instance of the Coquille Mill and Mercantile Co., and was for the consideration of a request for certain franchises desired by that company. This firm having interested eastern parties in an enterprise, it is the intention to enlarge and extend the interests of the concern to gigantic proportions. Franchises for a street railway system and an electric lighting and power plant were asked. As a guarantee of good faith the council prepared a contract to which the company subscribed obligating them to construct a saw mill 50x300 feet, three stories high with a daily capacity of 50,000 feet or more, with a furniture factory and pulp mill in connection, the latter to be of 16 tons daily capacity. The power plant and mill are to be in operation within 15 months, and street railway in three years.

The ordinances had been previously drawn and upon discussion by the council and a number of citizens present, were adopted, and the contract has been duly signed and accepted by the council, and from all appearances work will be commenced at an early date to speedily carry out the terms of the agreement.

He was a man of education and good raising, well informed on most subjects of general interest, and bore the friendship of all with whom he became acquainted. His remains were laid to rest Saturday in a neat casket furnished by our townsman, Arthur Ellingson, who had known the old gentleman since he himself was a child, and they had worked many months side by side in the shipyards of the lower river, from which many crafts are now sailing with seams securely corked by his hands. The deceased was about 85 years of age.
