Norris & Rowe Circus Coming.

Norris & Rowe's Circus will be in Roseburg Tuesday April 27. More attention than ever has been given this season to the free street display which has always been a remarkable feature of the Greater Norris & Rowe Circus. Those who find perennial pleasure in circus parades will note the unusual attractiveness in this season's spectacular pageant upon the streets.

Norris & Rowe claim to have as great a menagerie as any circus in the world. They have so many wild beasts that they can open the dens to the public gaze and still have a large menagerie in the animal tent to appease the most enthusiastic lover of wild animals. Therefore all dens and cages in this season's parade will be thrown open. The costumes of the riders are entirely new and unusually picturesque this year; more bands of music have been added; the sleek well-educated thoroughbred horses will share in interest with the superb heavy draft stock. Camels, llamas, dromedaries, and elephants will lead the procession. Beautiful new tableaux floats and artistically carved wagons will be shown. The two big wagons containing the always-looked-for clowns have not been neglected, so that the children may have their annual laugh. The parade starts every morning at 10:20 and it always attracts dense throngs to the shopping districts. The new tiny baby camel and the little lion cubs will be displayed in the parade and once the children see these features, they will probably have eyes for nothing else.

### A Trotting Bull.

Waynesburg, Pa., April 15.—Racing experts who follow the trotting game at the county fairs in Western Pennsylvania, are making "future books" on the expected performances of the original racing bull, which will be entered against all comers in the trots this summer. This bull has been trained secretly by Dr. Joseph D. Chaney and John H. Ross for the last three years. He is a "natural trotter," and before he was old enough to "take his meals away from home," as Dr. Chaney said, he was making phenomenal time up and down the barn lot.

The bull has made a half-mile in 1:22 hitched to a sulky, and its owners have issued a challenge for mile races with the fastest horses that can be found at the fairs. Several matches have been arranged. The bull is four years old.

### This Cow has a Record.

The production in one year of 17,005 pounds of milk is the phenomenal record of Lady Dundee De-Kol, a register Holstein cow owned by B. B. Goff, a farmer living seven miles from Forest Grove. The record of the animal was kept by Mr. Goff, and extends from March 19, 1908, to March 18, 1909.

On a certain date during that time she made a record of 85 1/2 pounds, and in May her average daily test for two weeks was 80 pounds. In that same month she produced 2335 pounds of milk. The record for the cow for the various months follows: March, 675; April, 2296; May, 2335; June, 1900; July, 1720; August, 1295; September, 1080; October, 980; November, 1005; December, 1100; January, 1045; February, 975; March, 600. During April, May and June, Lady Dundee was milked three times each day.—Exchange.
