## Morgan Money Pours West.

New York, April 30.—The consummation of a deal whereby J. P. Morgan and company, the First National bank and the National City bank purchased \$5,000,000 unifying and refunding five per cent bonds of the California Gas and Electric corporation is believed by those familiar with Wall street sentiment regarding western investments to be a forerunner of enormous investments of capital on the Pacific coast by New York financiers.

The announcement of the deal was made late yesterday and is regarded as verifying the rumor that the Morgan interests are to become permanent factors in the public utility corporations of the west. This purchase with the recent acquisition of the bonds of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, valued at \$15,000,000, and other purchases, brings the total of Morgan's California investments since July 1 last year to \$30,000,000. That the \$5,000,000 concerned in the big deal is a portion of an issue of \$45,000,000 authorized by the California Gas and Electric corporation is the announcement today of N. W. Halsey and company, the firm through which the purchase was made. The proceeds of the flotation it is thought, will be used in a refunding plan through which many California holdings will be consolidated in a single corporation.

## Reduce Lumber 40 Per Cent.

Seattle, Wash., April 28.—Twenty-six of the leading lumber manufacturers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, who control to a large extent the rail shipments of the product from this section to the east, met here today and determined to reduce the production of lumber 40 per cent.

The order to the mills will go out in a very short time—probably within two days—if the lumbermen who took part in the conference today do not change their minds.

The reason for the drastic curtailment, which will be followed by wholesale reduction in working crews and indorsements of the mills, is found in the fact that there is practically no demand for Northwestern lumber from the yards in the East and Middle West.

While the tariff is under discussion lumber dealers in the East refuse to buy lumber.

## Taft May Get \$25,000.

Washington, April 27.—Chairman Tawney had a conference with President Taft today relative to his proposed Alaska trip. Mr. Taft expressed a desire to visit the Northwest and Alaska during the summer, and Mr. Tawney will include an item of \$25,000 for Presidential traveling expenses in the deficiency appropriation bill, which will also carry the fund for the census, etc.

## Eastern Cities Suffer by Storms

New York, April 29.—After a month of extreme cold and unseasonable weather, New York experienced a snow storm this morning. In the city it melted as fast as it fell but in the suburbs the ground was covered.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 29.—Snow, rain and sleet fell throughout Wisconsin last night. In many places, three inches of snow are reported to have fallen.

## What is Being Done to Advertise Oregon.

Portland, April 26.—Swift and Company announce that they plan to begin actual packing operations in their new plant at Portland in July. This brings to the surface the necessity for the farmers of Oregon to grow more hogs. Pigs can be raised until they are three months old on vetch or other roughage at practically no expense other than for pasturage. A fat 200 pound hog in Portland today is worth \$15.50 cash, live weight. The packers will have to get a supply, must they send the money for the hogs to Nebraska, or will we raise them in Oregon.

The Livestock Sale at the Portland Country Club this week means a great deal to everyone in Oregon. Saturday and Sunday witnessed thousands of people visiting the grounds to inspect what is universally conceded to be the greatest gathering of blooded horses ever collected in the Pacific Northwest to be sold to the highest bidder. The sales at Portland have uniformly been more successful than even those in Chicago, in proportion. The sale will continue up to Friday night at the Country Club, Saturday being devoted entirely to cattle at the Union Stock Yards. Oregon is making a wonderful showing, and there is assurance that buyers will be here from all neighboring states and British Columbia.

Two millions of dollars for the four hundred and sixty two acres universally known as the "Ladd Farm" puts Portland city lots in a class with Oregon orchards, and the developers of this magnificent property will certainly be satisfied if it pays dividends equalling those of a well-kept, modern orchard.

While estimates as to the present population of Oregon vary, some men who have the right to be called well posted feel that the state today has upward of three-quarters of a million people. With every county in the state getting new settlers, some have attracted a greater immigration during the past year than for five years before.

A party of Illinois investors recently clubbed together and sent one of their number, who had visited Oregon during the Exposition for a trip through the state. Upon his return to Portland, this gentleman said he had found Oregon people much changed. At that time they were intensely conservative, today they are enthusiastic, optimistic, and unanimously predict a great future. In fact, many of the communities are growing so rapidly that they imagine they have all the growth, but those who have seen the new orchards, the substantial farm houses and other improvements record-breaking advancement along every line. Asked if he was satisfied, he replied: "I wouldn't return to Illinois, but shall remain here to receive my friends who are coming in parties of three, five and even ten."

## Safe Blowers Jailed.

Pendleton, Or., April 27.—Sheriff Taylor and Deputy Bert Wilson returned this morning, having in custody the three men accused of blowing the safe and burning a store at Weston. Two of the trio are believed to have served sentences in the Oregon penitentiary. They give the supposedly assumed names of Murray, Clark and Burke. They had a complete safe-blowing outfit, including a bottle of nitro glycerine, in their possession, as well as new gloves, shoes and hats, which they had stolen from the Weston store, though all marks had been taken from the garments. They refused to talk and made no effort to explain their whereabouts on the night of the burglary.
