## Wm. Barklow Meets Death

William Barklow, aged 23 years, was crushed and instantly killed at the Aasen Bros' logging camp on Rineck Creek Monday afternoon just before quitting time by being caught between a log which was being drawn by the donkey along the hillside and which took a roll, catching Mr. Barklow between the log and a maple stump.

The deceased was a son of Mrs. Anna Barklow, of Myrtle Point, and of the late Rev. John Barklow, the latter of whom passed over several years ago. Beside his mother he leaves three brothers, Prof. J. H., John D. Nathan and three sisters, Mrs. J. L. Randleman of Mapleton, Mrs. C. E. Broadbent of Myrtle Point and Miss Alta Barklow, the latter residing in California.

The funeral takes place at the Norway Cemetery today.

## Woman's Relief Corps.

The Woman's Relief Corp gave a dinner to the old soldiers and their families at the M. W. A. Hall May 5th.

The tables were very beautifully decorated with flowers and fairly groaning under their load of good things prepared by the untiring efforts of the ladies.

It was with mingled feelings of astonishment and amusement that some of our most distinguished townsmen were caught with their pockets filled with silverware. After dinner a social time was enjoyed by all.

One hundred and twenty-five partook of the repast, seventeen of whom were old soldiers, some of them visiting members from other Posts.

The occasion was one long to be remembered by all present and it is the intention of the Corps ladies to give a social dinner to the veterans every year.

Grandma Mast, an early pioneer of Coos County, passed away at the home of her son, Web Mast at Lee yesterday, May 11, at the advanced age of ninety or ninety-one years. The funeral takes place at the family burying grounds on the old homestead today.

At its last session the County Court granted a franchise or right to the parties who secured the franchise from the City of Coquille for an electric street railway and electric lighting system, to use the County roadway for a railway system between here and Roseburg as far as the county line.

Sunday morning special services will be held at the First Methodist Church in honor of pioneers and old people. This will be an anniversary occasion to be observed throughout the county. G. H. Feese will preach the sermon. A cordial invitation is extended to attend the service.

J. A. Tobin, of Los Angeles, California, arrived here yesterday and is enjoying a very pleasant visit with his daughter, Mrs. E. A. McDuffee, of this city. Mr. Tobin was a pioneer of Coos County, but went to California about 23 years ago. He has met a number of old acquaintances since arriving in town.

At the municipal election of this city Monday evening, A. W. Kelley was re-elected recorder, and W. L. Kistner, A. T. Morrison and J. C. Moomaw were elected councilmen, but Mr. Moomaw will not qualify, and J. M. Nye will be the third councilman. By a vote one majority the pet Jersey will still be allowed to nip the daisies from our streets as usual.

Last Friday afternoon fire broke out in what is known as Mother's Restaurant in Marshfield and did considerable damage to the building in which the fire originated beside two or three others. We have heard no estimate as to the amount of damage done, but the fire laddies did good work and soon had the flames subdued.
