BOOSTER NOTES.

After a whole week spent in touring Washington points, the special train of Portland business men pulled into the Station Saturday night with excursionists intensely enthusiastic over a trip that will be discussed in the Portland Commercial Club and about town for a long time to come. Never were hosts more hospitable than the Washington communities, never was good fellowship more prevalent, never did entertainers realize more thoroughly the community of their interests in the development of the Pacific Northwest. The marvelous activity and prosperity of the whole state of Washington was a constant source of comment to the Oregonians and they had expected much. Regarding Bounties.

The state bounty law which will go into effect on the 22nd of May, provides a bounty of \$1.50 for each coyote or coyote pup, \$5 for each gray or black wolf, \$2.50 for each gray wolf pup or black wolf pup, \$2.00 for each bob cat, wildcat or lynx, \$10.00 for each mountain lion, panther or cougar.

In order to obtain this bounty, one half of which is paid by the state of Oregon, and the other half by the county, the person killing any of the animals above mentioned must present within six months of the date of killing to the county clerk of the county in which said animal was killed, the entire skin of such animal, must include all four of the paws, the tail the skin of the entire head, including both ears and eyeholes and the skin to the tip of the nose, and at the same time must make affidavit as to the kind of animal, when killed etc., and in addition thereto shall be attached and made a part thereof an affidavit of a resident taxpayer of the county, giving his postoffice address and stating that he is personally acquainted with the applicant.

The county clerk will be required to examine the entire skin and either cut off the two front paws five inches from the bottom or the entire scalp. Affidavit can be made before the county clerk only.

Fire At Penitentiary.

Salem, Or., May 4.—The foundry, molding room and polishing room of the Northwest stove works at the penitentiary were completely destroyed by fire tonight. Loss \$30,000.

The fire originated in the blast in the afternoon. It smoldered until late tonight. The flames spread with great rapidity, carried along by the greasy rafters before being discovered.

The burned buildings were 100 feet from the main prison structure. At the first alarm all the guards were called out and the trustees released. As the flames advanced it became apparent that the main structure was not in great danger unless the gasoline tanks exploded, and the prisoners were kept in their cells, though under heavy guard. The fire-fighting facilities were utterly inadequate and the only attempt made was to prevent the flames from communicating to the main structure, where over 500 convicts were confined.

All the buildings destroyed were recently remodeled and thousands of dollars' worth of expensive machinery, recently installed by Lowenberg & Goings, were utterly ruined.

At midnight the fire was under control and danger passed.

Lady Loses Damage Suit.

Oakland, Cal., May 11.—Because she was wearing high-heeled shoes when she was injured by a fall from a street car Mrs. Anna Peterson lost her suit for damages against the Oakland Traction company. Counsel for the corporation advanced the plea that Mrs. Peterson was guilty of contributory negligence, as no woman wearing high heels could expect to navigate a level street, let alone step hurriedly from a car, without being overbalanced by such footwear. Superior Judge Fred V. Wood held the same view and gave the Oakland Traction company judgment for the costs of the action.
