## Field and Tract Meet.

The first Coos county High School field and tract meet which was pulled off here yesterday was won by the Marshfield High School by a decisive score and was a success in every way. The attendance exceeded the anticipation of the promoters of the event, making the gate receipts sufficient to defray all expenses and insuring the schools that the public is willing to assist in making it an annual event. The points won by the schools entered were:

Coquille..... 7  
Myrtle Point..... 4

Nearly all of the events were closely contested and gave the crowd all that they could expect in the way of sport. Everything was pulled off without a hitch.

In the evening, the Marshfield High School tendered a banquet and reception to the visitors at the new High School, making their stay here a most enjoyable one.

While it is a little too early to make the definite announcement that a Coos County Athletic Association will be formed for the purpose of conducting the annual field and tract meet, many who witnessed yesterday's meet are in favor of it. While the arrangements for yesterday's event fell largely on Principal Ferguson of the Marshfield High School, and was a success in every way, it is a little too much for one man.

The 220-yard dash was the first event and the entries were: Coquille, M. Custer; Bandon, Gallier and Blackerby; Myrtle Point, Brewer, Schneider and Reed; Marshfield, Rasmussen, Briggs and Merchant. The finish was: Rasmussen, 1st; Gallier, 2nd; Schneider, 3rd. Time: 36 and 3-5 seconds. Points were: Marshfield, 5; Bandon, 4.

The broad jump was next with the following entries: Coquille, Knowlton, Gilliam and Thrift; Bandon, Gallier; Myrtle Point, Reed and Adams; Marshfield, K. Clinkinbeard, J. Clinkinbeard, G. Stutsman and E. Wieder. Wieder took first place with 18 feet 4 inches; Knowlton, second; Reed, third. Points: Marshfield, 5; Coquille, 3; Myrtle Point, 1.

## Fatal Accident.

Another fatal accident occurred Monday shortly after noon, this time at Johnson's mill, three miles above town, and the victim is Henry Gouthier. Mr. Gouthier attempted to remove a belt from a revolving pulley with a stick when the stick was caught by the belt jerking him forward taking him off his balance when he fell against the pulley, a large bolt in which struck him in the back part of the head twice, fracturing the skull and rendering him unconscious in which condition he remained till his life ebbed away at 7:30 the following morning. Mr. Gouthier came here some four or five years ago and followed butter making the first season or so he was here, operating the Mountain Springs Creamery near Riverton. Later he purchased the Bingham place near the mouth of Fishtrap and later operated the electric light plant of Frank Morse for a time, but has later been working in the mill. His relatives live in California, except a cousin, Mrs. C. M. Goodman, of this city.

Directions as to the disposition of the body await a message from the parents of the deceased, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gouthier, of Petrolia, California.

## New Railroad Project.

Cottage Grove, Or., May 14.—This city is stirred up over the prospects of railroad building to the coast, although efforts are being made by the promoters to avoid unnecessary publicity at this time. The project on foot is to extend the Oregon & Southern railroad, now operating from this city to the foot of the Bohemia mountains, to Coos Bay, the route lying westward from this city to the Siuslaw, and through the mountains to the Coos Bay terminal. The length of the proposed road is about 75 miles.

Just how far arrangements for extension of the road have progressed is not generally known, but it is certain that several eastern capitalists were here yesterday, one of them representing a big Chicago contracting firm, conferring with those who are interested locally. The easterners are said to include the vice-president of the Pullman Car Company, the president of the St. Louis system, and other heavy financiers. It is said that the assurance of ample Capital to build the road is almost positive, and that preliminary work will not be long delayed.—Roseburg Review.
