Fastest Boat for Coos Bay.

A. H. Powers has purchased the General II, the fastest motor boat on the Pacific coast, and will have her here for service on the Bay within a few weeks. It will be for Mr. Power's private use but of course he will not be averse to speeding up with anyone who tries to run circles around him on any of his trips around the Bay or the inlets.

The General II was built at Sacramento and has a record of a trifle more than twenty-six miles per hour. In a recent race over a ten mile course near Frisco, the General II defeated Prentiss N. Gray's motor boat which was heretofore the fastest small craft on the coast.

The General II had a lead of about a length, having maintained a speed of a trifle more than 25 miles per hour. The race was the first of a series of three out of five, the other two having been scheduled for this week. Whether the sale of the boat will affect these is not known. Unless the General II is held there to complete the match it is expected that she will be shipped here on the Nann Smith this week.—Coos Bay Times.

Will Test Port Law.

At a meeting of the Coos Bay Port Commission in the office of the secretary, Henry Sengstacken, yesterday afternoon, definite arrangements were made to have a friendly suit instituted to test the constitutionality of the act. The details of the suit were not fully decided upon the meeting adjourning until 7 o'clock this evening to perfect the arrangements.

It is likely that Quarry and Hollister of North Bend, will institute the action and C. R. Peck will defend the commission.

Henry Sengstacken, as secretary of the commission, was instructed to open correspondence with financiers relative to placing a bond issue to defray expenses of work that will be necessary before the commission will receive any money from taxation.

The secretary was also instructed to ascertain the assessed valuation of the property in the Port of Coos Bay district, the same to be secured from the county assessor, T. J. Thrift.—Coos Bay Times.

Big Vote on Port.

Eugene, Ore., May 29.—The election in the 10 western precincts of Lane county resulted in a large majority in favor of creating the port of Siuslaw and of bonding the precincts for \$100,000 to improve the harbor at Florence. The vote for the proposition was 314 and against it 69.

Veterans' Bodies Moved.

Brownsville, Tex., May 29.—The bodies of 157 soldiers, troops of general Zachary Taylor, who were found among the old earthworks at Isabelle, Tex., were buried in the National cemetery at Fort Brown today. The washing away of the earth by the heavy rains few months ago brought to the surface some of the bones and buttons bearing the United States Army and an investigation led to the discovery of the remains.

Invited to Visit Coos Bay.

Washington, May 28.—Senator Bourne has invited the National Waterways Commission, which will take a Western trip during the coming summer, to visit Coos Bay and other Oregon points. It is expected the entire commission, which is composed of members of the Senate and House, will not visit the Pacific Coast, but that a subcommittee will go to places west of the Mississippi.

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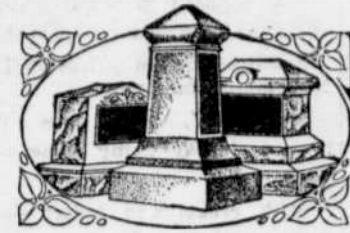
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
