Publicity For Oregon.

Portland, Or., June 29 (Special)—"Oregon is the place for you," has been the slogan brought to the attention of 5,000,000 people of the country through a big advertisement in the Saturday Evening Post, placed by the Portland Commercial Club, and the same message has been sent to 1,000,000 through other publications. Reason why Oregon is the state of opportunity have been presented. The 92 commercial bodies of the state having membership in the Oregon Development League have been given an opportunity without cost to them to answer immediately thousands of new inquiries about Oregon. Never before has Oregon been so well known and interest in the state so generally aroused. All that is needed to get the best results for the commercial bodies to take advantage of the opportunity and make these home-seekers familiar with their sections by sending them literature and answering inquiries.

Salem is making preparations for the fourth annual cherry fair to be held in the Capital City July 8 and 9. The people of Salem make a big event every year of the cherry show and the fete this season will eclipse anything of the kind ever held there, according to those in charge of the programme. The fair will be held at the time of the midsummer meeting of the State Horticultural Society at Salem. There will be addresses by prominent orchardists and specialists and a trip through the orchards about Salem on Friday, July 9, will be a feature of the gathering. Fruit growers of the state are making plans to attend.

Oregon was well represented at the tri-state bankers' convention at Seattle last week. Many prominent in the financial affairs of the state were in attendance. The sessions were of unusual interest and because of the bankers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho meeting together, a closer relation was established between the financial interests of the Pacific Northwest.

That Oregon has immense trade possibilities with China, which offers a great market for the manufactures as well as the new products of this country, is the opinion of Quan Kai, a wealthy Chinese merchant of Hong Kong, who has been a Portland visitor for the past few days. He believes an era of closer commercial relations with the United States is about to dawn for his country and he welcomes a larger commerce with the Pacific Coast. Quan Kai says his country is entering upon a period of expansion and must have railway materials, machinery of all kinds and manufactured products in addition to the lumber, wheat and flour, the chief commodities secured from this Coast, saying that his people prefer to trade with this country in preference to the English and German exporters who have the bulk of this trade at present.

California business men on the recent trade excursion north got a lesson from modern, enterprising Medford. A city of 6,000 people took the party of 100 visitors out in autos and had enough cars left over for as many more. Could any California agricultural city of the same size, not a center for tired out and back number millionaires; have turned a like trick?

The price of butter fat still holds up well, as will be seen by the prices paid by the creameries last Tuesday, the 15th, which were as follows: Capital 28¢; Central 29¢; Grizzly Bluff 28¢; Pioneer 28¢; Eel River 28¢; Ferndale 29 1-4¢; Riverside 29 1-4¢—Ferndale Enterprise of June 18.

At a pretty home wedding Wednesday, June 22, at high noon, Mr. Claude Arthur Waters and Miss Millie Laura Talbot were united in marriage at the home of the groom near Lee, Rev. C. H. Barklow officiating.

The ceremony took place in the orchard in the presence of 75 or 100 guests. The altar was arranged between four full fruited cherry trees. A festooned path strewn with roses led to the altar, the ceremony being performed beneath a wedding bell of white roses. The bride was attended by Miss Marjorie Lowe as bridesmaid and the groomsmen was Clarence Waters, brother of the groom. Berice and Eunice, twin daughters of Mr. and Mrs. P. S. Robison of Norway were flower girls and Mabel Brown daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Brown was ring bearer. Miss Zoe Haskins presided at the piano and played the wedding march. The bride was gowned in a white satin princess, wore a veil with orange blossoms and carried a bouquet of white carnations. The bridesmaid's gown was of cream mull and she carried a bouquet of pink carnations.

After the ceremony and congratulations the guests were seated at a table spread in the orchard and served with a very choice dinner, piano music and singing affording entertainment while they ate. Two New Dairy Barns.

J. A. Yoakam, the architect contractor and builder, has lately completed two dairy barns on Cunningham which are a credit to both the owners as well as the builder. The one for J. C. Watson is 46x92 feet; basement 30 feet in the clear, the plates being 54 feet from base to ridge. It will accommodate 35 head of cattle, and 12 horses. Gangway 18ft runs through basement for feeding. Each cow has separate stall and movable manger fitted up in modern style. There is a 210 foot gangway running through the barn for unloading hay at a height of 30ft. Mows will hold 200 tons of hay. The roof is of the Gambrel self-supporting style. The other barn is that of C. E. McCurdy, a near neighbor of Mr. Watson. This structure is 42x60 feet, 20 foot standing, entirely self-supporting roof. Holds 35 head of stock. Is 43 feet from base to ridge, has gangway through the center for feeding and machinery. Has chutes for feeding and is fitted with box stalls.

Funeral of Alex Urquhart.

The funeral of Alex Urquhart, a well-known Coos county pioneer took place at St. James church in this city, conducted by Rev. W. Horsfall on the 26th inst. Death occurred at the state hospital at Salem on the 21st, and was caused by the rupture of a blood vessel on the brain. He was 67 years of age and leaves a wife and son to mourn his departure. He had been a resident of Coos county for more than forty years. Was a thorough millwright and mechanic and had followed that vocation on Coos Bay and the Coquille most of that time. Some years ago he moved onto a farm near Riverton but later sold that and has since been a resident of this city. He was born at Pietou, Nova Scotia, but became a citizen of the United States when a young man.

Driven Insane by Awful Heat.

New York, June, 26.—Crazed by the terrific heat, Louis Loonam attacked his wife with a butcher knife at their home early today and inflicted injuries that may prove fatal.

According to the story Mrs. Loonam told at the hospital, after she had been revived sufficiently, Loonam has acted queerly since the heat wave struck the city. Soon after arising today, she said, he seized a knife from the kitchen table and after circling around her several times, muttering savagely, he leaped and struck her between the eyes. Her screams brought neighbors to her aid. Loonam was overpowered and held on the floor until the arrival of the police. He is confined at an east side police station, where it is thought he is hopelessly insane.

Another victim of the fearful heat, Francisco Subatini, slashed himself with a razor early today. He lies at the hospital and probably will die before night. He created a panic in the street before his home when he appeared in the doorway brandishing the razor and emitting maniacal screams.

Yesterday's record contains 12 additional deaths and more than 50 prostrations. Many of those who were overcome will probably die. Thousands again slept on the sidewalk last night and the suffering was intense in every section of the city.

A rain that fell in the early morning has moderated the temperature slightly. Many persons rushed from their beds to stand in the downpour.

Prof. Diller on Coos Bay.

J. S. Diller of Washington, D. C., a prominent member of the United States Geological Survey Service, and who made the first geological survey and investigation of the mineral resources of Coos county and southwestern Oregon, is here to make additional researches of this section.

While Mr. Diller has not made any public announcement of the purpose of his visit, it is understood to be largely for the purpose of correcting the old charts of the mineral deposits in this section and to make a special report on the development of these resources.

Prof. Diller made the original report to the government of finding traces of oil in this section. Whether he will make any particular investigation of these traces now, is not known.—Coos Bay Times.

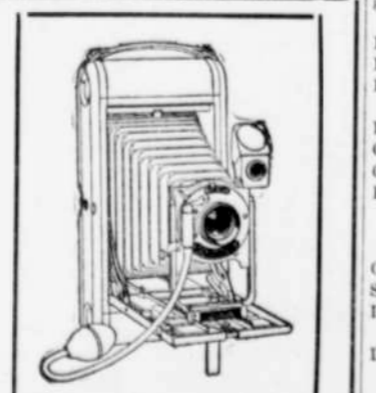
