METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH

CHARLES H. CLEAVES, PASTOR.



This was the first Methodist church established on the Coquille river, the organization being effected in the year 1875. Consequently the M. E. Church South stands as the Pioneer church of the city. Rev. Joseph Perkins was the first pastor of this church, which at the time of its organization consisted of seven members, of whom J. J. Lamb and wife, Grandma Lindley and Mrs. Roy still reside here. Rev. Stahl was the presiding elder at this time. Coquille was not much of a city at that time, there being only a few families here. But the founding of the church proved to be a successful undertaking.

In the year 1877 a church was built by subscription, and it was known as a universalist church, but all denominations were privileged to use it who so desired.

It was in the year 1888 that the M. E. church South erected an edifice, which, for that time, was considered an excellent structure. Rev. W. B. Smith was pastor at the time, and during his pastorate here the parsonage was built. About the year 1903 an addition was built on to the original church building, and the church now has a large auditorium, two excellent Sunday school rooms and a gallery.

The first Sunday School here was a union school, with Miss Laura Byers Superintendent, and Mrs. John Lawrence Treasurer.

About 1891, some of the other denominations having organized Sunday schools, the original organization became a Methodist school. J. J. Lamb became superintendent of the school in 1896, and has held this position ever since. The present enrollment of this school is 140.

The Epworth League was organized in 1894, and now has about 50 members. Mr. A. T. Morrison is president of this young people's organization.

The Woman's Home Mission Society was organized January 19, 1893 with 13 charter members. Mrs. John Lawrence was elected corresponding secretary and has filled this position since that time. There are at present 26 members of the society.

This is a very brief write-up of this church which has been a power for good in Coquille for so many years, but it may be a welcome bit of history to some readers.

This church has passed through many trials and tribulations incident to pioneer life, but these have been blessings in disguise. The membership is now 100, and all departments are well organized and the Coquille M. E. Church South is even yet one of the most desirable appointments of the Columbia Conference.

Rev. C. H. Cleaves, the present pastor was born in Kansas City Kansas, spending his boyhood days in the Middle West.

In September 1903 he entered Morrisville college in Morrisville Missouri, from which institution he graduated in June 1907 with the Bachelor of Arts degree. The following September he joined the South West Missouri conference M. E. church South and was stationed at Seneca, Mo. At this place there was a new modern brick church valued at \$7500. Two months later he was transferred to the Columbia Conference and stationed at Grants Pass. Remaining there one year, he was sent to Coquille.

The music at this church is far above the average. There is an excellent choir, and a Male Quartette recently organized is meeting with popular favor. We always aim to have good music.

Services are held in this church every Sunday, and pastor and congregation extend to all a hearty welcome to their midst.
