### FAIR NOTES

#### Interesting Facts About Seattle Exposition.

Seattle, June 29.—That the  
crowds at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific  
Exposition show a daily increasing  
number of tourists and visitors  
from outside points is testified by  
the managers of the various build-  
ings and concessions who have  
been noting the people at the Ex-  
position.

While for the first two weeks,  
the crowds were largely from the  
vicinity of Seattle, a change has  
been noticed. Outside visitors are  
beginning to pour into the city.  
The rooms are filling up but there  
is still ample provision for the ac-  
commodation of visitors.

The attendance at the Exposition  
has continued remarkably large.  
Up to Sunday, June 27, about six  
hundred thousand paid admission  
were reported by the gatekeepers.  
This is a number equal to nearly  
half of the total population of the  
State of Washington.

The week beginning Sunday,  
July 4, will be one of the most im-  
portant during the Exposition.  
Sunday will see another free con-  
cert by the Seattle Symphony  
orchestra. The Norwegian Evan-  
gelical Society will also give a con-  
cert on this day. This event has  
been prepared carefully and has  
attracted the attention of the Nor-  
wegians over the entire Coast.

On Sunday will also be held the  
Good Roads Conference of America,  
one of the most important confer-  
ences in the history of the West.  
This will be liberally attended by  
farmers from all parts of the state.  
Lectures will be given in the Good  
Roads Building by some of the  
most prominent experts of the  
country.

On Monday will begin Pythian  
week. The official day of the  
Knights of Pythias is Tuesday.  
The Constitutional convention and  
the Epworth League convention  
will be held Monday. The latter  
will be attended by a large number  
of delegates from all parts of the  
country.

Washington Day on Monday  
will be one of the gala days of the  
Exposition. A program replete  
with speeches and novel features  
has been prepared. It is believed  
that the attendance on this day  
will approach that of the opening  
day.

The Northwest Mining Associa-  
tion, whose delegates will represent  
the states of Washington, Oregon,  
Montana and Idaho will hold its  
convention Tuesday.

The women will be mistresses  
of the situation Wednesday, as this  
is the Woman Suffragist's Day.  
The Suffrage convention will be  
held Sunday, July 4. Vancouver,  
Wash., will also celebrate at the  
Exposition on Wednesday.

Thursday will be given over to  
the visitors from Billings, Mont.,  
Colfax, Wash., and South Bend,  
Wash. Friday is Oregon Day and  
Pacific Northwest Day. Saturday  
is Kansas, Polish, Portland and  
Sigma Chi Day.

Proceeding this week on Satur-  
day, July 3rd, King County Day  
will attract a large attendance.  
On this day, strawberries large and  
luscious will be served to visitors  
at the King County Building.

**To Make the Cow Gain Milk.**  
Good care and feeding are the  
essentials of preventing a cow de-  
creasing in her milk, but the ani-  
mal can not be crowded beyond her  
capacity. In other words, we feed  
an animal more to retain her nat-  
ural production rather than to in-  
crease abnormally her production.  
It is sometimes thought that by  
certain rations one can feed an ani-  
mal so as to make it give an ab-  
normal flow of milk and an abnor-  
mal amount of butter. This is a  
mistake. We can, however, supply  
the animal with all requirements  
in the way of nutriment, so that  
she will do everything that is nat-  
ural and proper for her to do. By  
giving a good balanced ration at  
regular intervals, careful handling  
as to milking, etc., are the only  
known means to make an animal  
do her best at milk production.—  
Pacific Homestead.
