### Carries Eye in Hand.

San Francisco, July 21.—Hold-  
ing in his hand his right eye which  
had been torn from its socket by a  
meathook, Andrew Anderson, a  
butcher, calmly walked into the  
receiving hospital today and asked  
surgical aid. Despite the terrible  
agony he had endured Anderson  
merely said:

"I got tangled with a hook and  
pulled out this eye," holding it out  
for the surgeon to examine.  
The accident happened when An-  
derson tried to keep his hat from  
being blown by the wind. He  
slipped on the sidewalk and fell  
against the hook.

The injured man drove a dozen  
blocks after the accident to get aid.  
Anderson's stoicism astonished the  
physicians. They say that Ander-  
son's capacity to endure pain had  
had never been equalled to their  
knowledge.—Roseburg Review.

### Pioneer Passes Away.

F. J. Steckel, a resident of Ore-  
gon for more than forty years and  
a well-known citizen of Coos Bay,  
died at his home in Millington Wed-  
nesday afternoon after a lingering  
illness of about one year. He was  
about 77 years old.

For many years, Mr. Steckel was  
an employe of the E. B. Dean Lum-  
ber Company, the predecessor of the  
C. A. Smith Lumber and Manu-  
facturing Company. He was born  
in Pennsylvania but moved to Ore-  
gon about forty years ago, first set-  
tling in Josephine county where he  
resided a number of years.

Besides his widow, Mr. Steckel  
is survived by several children  
namely Mrs. Lincoln Ellis of Wolf  
Creek, Josephine county, Mrs.  
Leonard Masters of Sumner, Cyrus  
Steckel of Eastside, Wm. Steckel of  
Millington, Mrs. Earnest Daven-  
port of Millington, Mrs. Ray Wat-  
son of Coquille, Gilbert Steckel of  
Sumner, Martin Steckel of Milling-  
ton, Leon Steckel of Millington and  
twelve grand-children.—Times.

## Letter From J. F. McIndoe.

Mr. E. D. SPERRY,

It having come to the notice of  
the undersigned that you have ex-  
pressed an interest in the pending  
proposition for the improvement of  
Coquille River from the mouth, in-  
cluding the bar thereof, up to  
Myrtle Point, you are hereby in-  
formed that the preliminary exami-  
nation of the locality named, with  
a view to certain improvements  
therein, authorized by the Act of  
Congress approved March 3, 1909,  
has been made, and that the report  
submitted thereon, while favorable  
to the improvement of the river  
above the mouth, is unfavorable to  
any further improvement of the bar  
channel at the present time. A sur-  
vey has been authorized between  
Parkersburg and Myrtle Point, in  
order to determine to what extent  
this stretch of the river is worthy  
of improvement.

You are further notified that all  
interested parties have the privilege  
of an appeal from this conclusion  
to the Board of Engineers for Riv-  
ers and Harbors, a permanent body  
sitting at Washington, D. C., to  
which all examination and survey  
reports of this character are refer-  
red. Parties desiring to do so may  
be heard on appeal to the Board,  
either orally or in writing. Writ-  
ten communications should be ad-  
dressed to the Board of Engineers  
for Rivers and Harbors, Rooms  
507-510 Colorado Building, Wash-  
ington, D. C., and should be mailed  
in time to be in the possession of  
the said Board within three weeks  
from the date of this communica-  
tion. If oral hearings are desired,  
dates for the same may be arranged  
for by correspondence with the  
Board.

You are requested to communi-  
cate the foregoing to any persons  
known by you to be interested in  
the improvement and who not be-  
ing known to this office, do not re-  
ceive a copy of this communication.

### Deer Law.

The deer season will open August  
1 and close on November 1. A few  
salient points of the game code re-  
lating to deer are noted:  
Buck deer—Season open from  
August 1 to November 1. Unlaw-  
ful to kill more than five in one  
season. Unlawful to hunt between  
one hour after sunrises. No deer  
meat whatsoever may be sold.

Female deer—Unlawful to kill at  
any time.

It is unlawful to use dogs or to  
watch stands or trails.

No young deer or spotted fawn  
may be killed.
