The Cody Mill Burned.

Devastating flames Thursday night destroyed he saw mill belonging to the Cody Lumber Company of Bandon, and one hundred and fifty men are temporarily out of employment as a result. The fire wiped out every vestige of the mill, its docks and everything surrounding the site. The steamer truction, as she had left the docks a short time before the fire broke out. The Bandon loaded what lumber she could take out over the Bandon bar, and then came to Coos Bay to finish out her load.

The fire originated in the engine Flanagan c room, and it is supposed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion, the fire communicating to the oil-soaked floors. The mill was McNair, cf. located at the edge of the city, and the hre department was unable to stay the progress of the flames.

The mill had a capacity of 100,-900 feet per day and was built three years ago last winter. Since she Chapman, If ... was started, there has never been a Baker, p delay of any charater except for repairs, and it has run continuously, grinding out the excellent lumber for which Coos county is noted. There were seventy men employed in the lumber camps on Lampa creek and nearly as many more about the mill and surroundings. For the immediate present, all these men will be out of employment, and a day or so will tell whether they will be so permanently.

The Cody Lumber Company is a very strong concern financially, and the principal owners are Col. C. E. Porterfield; Passed ball-Troch; Coach, of Chicago, J. L. Cody and Col. R. H. Rosa, of Bandon, and George Moors, of Michigan. It is understood that Moore and Coach have the largest interests in the concern, and being men of ample means, there is nothing else to be expected except that they will rebuild the mill at the quickest time possible.

This forecast is substantiated by the fact that Moore and Coach con-trol extensive timber tracts in the Coquille country and naturally would see that the manufacture of lumber is not dropped. This company has been shipping their lumber on the steamers Ban-don and Fifield, and the temporary
