Grange Picnic.

In the beautiful myrtle grove near Norway there was held last Saturday a Grange picnic, largely attended by one of the happiest crowds that ever had gathered there.

Coquille Grange, the charter of which was closed last Thursday with a list of 60 members, and Myrtle Grange, of Myrtle Point, exchanged fraternal greetings for the first time.

Mr. Price Robison, Master of Myrtle Grange, presided and gave a hearty address of welcome. This was followed by a splendid program consisting of Grange songs by a Grange choir; a recitation by Master Arthur Wetmore which secured applause. Little Misses Ivy Dodge and Irene Kime each sang a solo, both of which were heartily applauded, the last named responding to an encore.

Miss Lydia Dodge presided at the organ with marked ability.

State Deputy Cyrus H. Walker was the first speaker introduced, who reviewed rapidly the history of Oregon, beginning with the expedition of Lewis and Clark in 1804-5, who blazed the Oregon trail to the Pacific Ocean. Then the coming of the first missionaries to the Indians in 1834, of Rev. Jason Lee and his three helpers. Rev. Parker came in 1835, Whitman and Spaulding and wives in 1836, the latter the first white woman to cross the Rocky mountains. Then in 1838, Mr. Walker's parents and the Revs. C. Ellis, A. B. Smith and W. H. Gray and their wives. The journey from the Missouri river to Whitman's in the Walla Walla valley was made on horseback. Contrast was made between those early days and the Oregon of today.

Then the work of the Grange was taken up, giving some of the work accomplished and what is now in progress and yet to be done.

Some things are, to maintain Oregon's initiative and referendum law; oppose a ship subsidy; oppose the proposed reduction of the tax of ten cents per pound on colored oleomargarine to one cent, as will likely be attempted during the next Congress. Every farmer and dairyman should belong to the Grange. It stands for the best interests of all the people.

Following Mr. Walker was a speech from Judge Schilb, delivered in very pleasant mood, preparing the way for the sumptuous seats provided by farmers' wives, noted for their culinary skill, and whose rich viands were greatly enjoyed.

Mrs. L. A. Roberts, secretary of Myrtle Grange, Myrtle Point, read a splendid paper making a plea for the Grange interests.

After the dinner hour Hon. Binger Hermann, of Roseburg, delivered one of his eloquent addresses, and while not a Granger, he extolled the Grange. He mentioned three objects it can assist—promoting good roads; improvement of rivers and harbors, and the building of railroads. In substance he said: "The Coquille river should be so improved as to insure navigation at all times from its mouth to Myrtle Point. Coos Bay should be made accessible to the largest vessels, thus opening a way to all the marts of the world. Brighter days are coming for Coos Bay and the county, and with the above improvements would come a magnificent future and a large prosperity."

Bay City Mill Resumes.

The C. A. Smith Lumber and Manufacturing company announced today that the old Bay City mill of the company which has been idle for a long time will be remodelled and equipped for service within a month or six weeks. The announcement was confirmed by J. E. Oren, manager of the C. A. Smith mill.

The starting of the Bay City mill will mean the employment of between 100 and 150 additional men in the company's mill on the Bay, and will mean a similar increase in the logging camps of the Smith-Powers logging company. The improvement in the lumber market is believed to be responsible for it.

The announcement, coupled with the resumption of the Simpson mills at North Bend and other plants in this section, will mean a new flood tide of prosperity for Coos Bay.—Coos Bay Times.

Accident on South Slough.

The Coos Bay Times of Sept. 6th., states that J. W. Grout of North Bend, road supervisor of the South Slough district, had his leg broken in two places and his head cut open, and Theodore Johnson of Empire was seriously if not fatally injured internally this morning, when a scaffolding for the approach to the South Inlet ferry gave way under them.

The injured men were brought to North Bend shortly after noon, Mr. Grout being taken to his home and Mr. Johnson to the Mercy hospital. Mr. Grout was conscious but in severe pain. Mr. Johnson was in a critical condition.

It seems that Grout and Johnson fell about twenty feet when the staging under them broke, some of the scaffolding falling on top of them.
