Electric Road Meeting at Myrtle Point.

Mayor Hawkins, R. H. Mast, S. J. Lyons and A. O. Hite took the members of the railroad committee and others to Myrtle Point in their automobiles, to attend a railroad meeting at that place Monday evening. There were twelve persons in the company, all enthusiastic workers for the electric road.

W. C. Chase reported to the Myrtle Point Committee that the mass meeting held in Roseburg on the 23rd of October, was a success in every particular. That Mr. Kuettner agreed with the joint committee that he would execute a bond in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars in some reliable bank in cash, as a guarantee that he and his Company would build the electric road, if the people of Douglas and Coos counties would secure the right of way and make the survey. Also that there should be a clause inserted in all deeds of right of way that in the event that the road was not built as agreed, the land should revert to the original owner. That the people of Roseburg are very much interested in the proposition, and are taking hold with a vim and determination to carry out their part of the agreement.

P. L. Phelan presided, and announced that the routine business having been transacted, a committee should be chosen to represent Myrtle Point on the general committee. J. O. Stemler was chosen to fill that position. It was stated by Mr. Phelan that everybody in that town were in favor of the electric road, and that they would be able to perform their part of the contract.

Now is the time to get upon the front seat in the wagon and boost. We have waited many years for a railroad, and thought several times that it was coming, but this is the first real definite proposition that has ever come to us along this line, and it is up to the people now to do their part and the road is assured. Evidence which has satisfied the members of the committee that the money was forthcoming for the construction of the road, has been furnished, and they are at work in full force that there may be no delay in formulating the preliminary steps for the right of way and survey, and it is up to each citizen to help in his way to carry out the project, and from my long acquaintance with the general public of this county, I feel assured that they will join in this effort.

Library Association Entertainment.

The active members of the Coquille Library Association are preparing for an entertainment, to be held at the pleasant home of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Howey on Friday evening, October first. The grounds will be lighted by bonfires, and tables are to be set out of doors for refreshments, weather permitting.

It is to be hoped that a large crowd will turn out for the double purpose of having a jolly, good time, and also to help the association in the laudable work of raising funds for the purpose of building and establishing a public library.

The little gasoline steamer, a sister ship to the Wilhelmina, was launched Tuesday from the stocks at Kruse & Bank's yard at Porter. She is the duplicate of the Wilhelmina with the exception of length, in which she exceeds her sister craft by 20 feet. She was christened Oskosh and is to ply between the Columbia and the Nehalem and Tillamook. The Oskosh has been ready for the water for some weeks, but a delay was caused by the non-arrival of her propellers and shafts. Her gasoline engines are now being placed in position and it is expected she will be ready for her trial trip in a week or ten days.—The Sun.

President Taft to Visit the A.-Y.-P. Exposition Sept. 29 to Oct. 1.

PRESIDENT WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT is to be the principal actor in a varied interesting program, which awaits him upon his arrival at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition in Seattle from September 29 to October 1. From the moment Bill Taft sets foot on the paved walks of the exposition he will have to keep pace with the various events in which he is scheduled to take part. His activities will have a wide range, too. And, then, the president's good nature is proverbial and his lieutenants have sent on word that the president will do his part to make the day a big success. His most formal appearance on the exposition grounds will be at a reception in the Washington state building at the official banquet. Following in line will be his initiation into the Arctic Brotherhood, the Alaska fraternal association. The president will also find time to address a monster crowd in the Natural Amphitheatre, mush down the Pay Sreak, attend an elaborate luncheon, visit the United States government buildings and the Igorroto village.

September 30 at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition will be one of the president's busiest days in the west and the people will be given every opportunity to see and hear him during his visit to the fair.
