FAIR NOTES

Interesting Facts About Seattle Exposition.

Seattle, Sept. 22.—The visit of President Taft will be a feature of the week from Monday, September 27 to Sunday, October 3, at the Exposition. According to A. D. Charlton, assistant general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific, the travel to the Fair will reach its highest point during this week.

A brilliant programme has been planned for President Taft's visit, Thursday. He will be banqueted in the New York State building, escorted through the Exposition grounds in a magnificent automobile parade, and tendered an elaborate reception in the Washington State building in the evening. The president will address the people of the Northwest in the natural amphitheatre of the fair, which seats 17,000 people, in the afternoon. After the reception in the evening Mr. Taft has consented to ride the goat as an initiate into the Arctic brotherhood. One hundred other candidates will be admitted into the northern order along with the president.

The opening of the livestock show on Monday to continue until October 9, will be the largest event of the programme of the last month at the Exposition. More than two thousand head of thoroughbred stock have been entered, and in the poultry department more than five thousand birds and fifteen hundred pigeons. The facilities for the handling of the livestock are the most modern that have ever been provided at any Exposition, over \$100,000 having been expended.

“Coming at a time of so many big events I fear that the greater part of the Northwest fail to appreciate the scope and magnitude of your live stock show. I regard it as the greatest display ever seen west of the Mississippi.”

So said Mr. S. McKelvie, editor and proprietor of the Nebraska Farmer, one of the oldest stock journals in the United States. Mr. McKelvie has acted as judge in a score of state fairs and a half dozen big expositions. He has an interest in the Ash Grove Stock Farm in Lincoln, Nebraska, and owns as fine a herd of Red Polled cattle as can be found anywhere. So his words mean something.

“I am personally acquainted with many of the breeders who are coming from the middle west,” continued Mr. McKelvie, “and I can assure you that the herds they are bringing are worth going many miles to see. The exposition will get the prize-winners in the Minnesota, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Iowa and Kansas state fair, and it will be interesting to see the best of the middle west compete against the best of the Northwest. Several of our breeders in Nebraska have joined together and are coming on a special train.”

This is one of the many expressions heard around the live stock headquarters these days. According to Professor Carlyle, superintendent in charge, entries in each and every class have far exceeded the most sanguine hopes of the department. He backs his statement by showing the visitor an overflow exhibit building which he was compelled to erect in order to handle the late entries.

The exposition appropriated an even \$100,000 for the live stock show and commenting on the quantity and quality of entries the other day President Chilberg said that it was the best money the fair ever spent.

Steamer Bandon Afloat.

The steamer Bandon is now afloat, having been sufficiently patched up so that the water has been pumped out and she is ready to be towed to San Francisco, put on dry dock and repaired permanently.

The Bandon has met with considerable bad luck in her comparatively short career, but she is a good vessel, and will again be made sea-worthy and perhaps from this time on she will be more lucky. She is the peer of any boat plying along the Pacific coast and carries 750,000 feet of lumber. Bandon people will be glad to know that she will be put back on this run again as soon as she is repaired.—Bandon Recorder.

Vicksburg, Sept. 21.—Wire communication with New Orleans was cut off early today following a storm which is sweeping the gulf coast from Florida to Texas. The total loss of life and the property damage resulting from the hurricane are unknown at this time.

Five are known to be dead at New Orleans, and at least 20 fishermen perished along the shore line when the gale struck the coast.

The waters from the gulf were driven inland, damaging the railroad tracks and buildings in towns along the coast. Wagon roads which were raised above the soft soil of the coast country have been washed out in many places and a number of bridges have been carried away.

Just before the wires went down today it was reported that the storm was abating.

Among the cities known to have suffered are New Orleans, Mobile, Biloxi, Miss., and Pensacola, Fla. A number of smaller places are reported to have been partially wrecked.
