**Good Roads Meeting.**

On Thursday evening of last week a very interesting meeting composed of delegations from Marshfield, North Bend, Bandon and Myrtle Point and a goodly number of the citizens of this city, took place in Nosler's hall, the object of which was to discuss the subject of "Good Roads." A. S. Hammond was chosen as chairman and Geo. T. Moulton secretary of the meeting. The subject of roads and the necessary materials of which to build them occupied the most of the evening. The road from the county line to Empire by way of Myrtle Point and Coquille received the greatest attention, but county roads in general were fully discussed. The one road mentioned, over which we depend on getting our mail, is the one of the greatest importance. After our mails are over the coast range, with our navigable waters, railroads and some fairly good county roads, we will be able to get along till these are improved, but at present the outlook for this winter is by no means flattering, and the quicker something definite along the line of permanent improvements the better.

Every country develops and its civilization is judged by its highways, and with the coming of the automobile, more clearly than ever will this become apparent, and Coos county is determined not to be too far behind.

It has for some time been conceded that this is a hard county in which to build roads, but Prof. Diller, a government geologist, who was present, assured those present that there are several places where the best of material for roads can be found in large quantities and not inconvenient.

A permanent county organization was formed. A. S. Hammond was elected chairman, G. T. Moulton secretary and A. J. Sherwood treasurer of the permanent organization, and the agitation of road improvement will be kept up.

There were different plans mentioned as to how a sufficient amount of funds could be raised. Since the laws of the state will not permit the issuance of bonds, direct taxation of property within a six-mile limit along the road, seemed the most favorable plan, and a committee was appointed to look the matter up and get the work under way. With a good all-year automobile road from Empire to Roseburg, Coos county would begin to realize that it is a portion of the state of Oregon.
