NEW MAIL CONTRACT

Communication from Washington Announces Change in Coos and Curry.

Postmaster H. B. Steward received communication from the department at Washington Wednesday morning announcing the changes made in the Coos and Curry county mail business through the awarding of a new contract. After October 31st, the routes between Roseburg and North Bend and between Roseburg and Coquille are to be discontinued, and in substitution therefor is established a route between Roseburg and Myrtle Point, which means that the service for this section is to come by way of Myrtle Point, discontinuing that over the Coos Bay wagon road.

The new contract is with V. H. Pease, the present contractor and the route is officially designated as follows. From Roseburg by Brockway, Olalla, Camas Valley, Remote and Bridge, to Myrtle Point. Delivery is to be made seven times a week and the service is to commence November 1st. The price at which the contract was let is \$14,000, which is several hundred dollars less than the price that was paid for the service over the two routes. The following schedule is given:

From June 16th to October 15th—leave Roseburg at 6 a. m., arrive in Myrtle Point in 15 hours, leave Myrtle Point at 7 a. m., arrive in Roseburg by 10 p. m. From October 16th to June 15th—leave Roseburg at 6 a. m.; arrive at Myrtle Point in 26 1/2 hours; leave Myrtle Point, at 8 p. m., arrive in Roseburg in 26 hours. In accordance with this schedule up to November 1st the mail will close in Myrtle Point at 6:30 p. m.

What arrangements have been made for delivering the mail from Myrtle Point to other postoffices of this section has not been announced here, but a train service will undoubtedly connect with the stage, and it is hoped that all sections of the county will be given better and prompter service than was given last winter over the two routes.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
