Platinum in Coos County.

Myrtle Point was visited last Saturday by Dr. David T. Day, who has charge of the mineral division of the geological survey in Washington, D. C. He was accompanied by Alex L. Macdonald of Schenectady, N. Y., where there is very extensive manufacturing plants for electric machinery. Dr. Day has been sent out for the purpose of gathering information in regard to the possibility of developing platinum mines along the coast, he having found that important mineral in samples sent him from Salmon Mountain and from the black sands sent from Bandon, while he had charge of the government mineral display at the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland five years ago. Mr. Macdonald is very much interested in platinum and no doubt will make an investment on a large scale if they find encouragement. It is a good omen to miners all along the coast that so able a man as Dr. Day is to examine the mineralogy of this section as he was a great help to the mining industry of Oregon when making tests at Portland. The distinguished parties went on down the coast. Dr. Day made a hasty test of some of the Salmon Mountain ore while here, and announced that he was satisfied that there is platinum to some extent and he found gold, silver and copper. He proposes to give instructions to miners as to how to save the platinum and other precious metals, as he is satisfied that there is much of that valuable metal thrown away in mining for gold. He stated that the world is now depending upon Russia for platinum, to be used in electrical machinery, and within ten years the supply will be exhausted and Uncle Sam is endeavoring to find it in plenty within his own domain.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

Washington, D. C. Nov. 5.—Confidential information from a source whose reliability cannot be questioned, was obtained here this afternoon making it apparently certain that no tidings of any mishap to Theodore Roosevelt has reached this country by way of any of the foreign cables. This seems to establish the fact that the rumor is without foundation.
