WRECKING OF THE CZARINA.

**Twenty-Four Find a Watery Grave—
But One Person Saved—Steamer
a Total Loss.**

The most appalling shipwreck that has ever occurred on this part of Oregon's sea coast, occurred on Wednesday afternoon of last week when the big steel coal carrying steamer, the Czarina, which carries coal from the Beaver Hill mine for the Southern Pacific Co.

This vessel is not a passenger boat, and carried but one person beside her crew, that being Harold Millis, son of C. J. Missis, general manager of the local Southern Pacific corporation operating the Czarina, the coal mine mentioned, and local railroad, the young man being a guest of the Captain as he was on his return to school, being a student of the University of California, after spending a short vacation with his parents at Marshfield.

Thus twenty-four went down to doom, while one alone, H. H. Kentzell, first assistant engineer, succeeded in reaching shore.

It seems that Captain Duggan did not fully realize the full force of the storm which prevailed at the time he made the attempt to go out. It was thought by some at first that something happened to her steering gear, but it is now the general belief that the storm was just too strong for the vessel, which rendered her unmanageable, and being trown in the trough of the heavy seas she soon foundered and settled on the sands of the North spit where she is rapidly going to pieces.

J. N. TAYLOR SUICIDES.

Bars Door in Central Hotel at Marshfield and Cuts Throat With Razor.
John N. Taylor, a logger, well known on the Coquille, suicided at the Central hotel in Marshfield one day last week by cutting his throat with a razor. He went into a room and barred the door with a chair, where he committed the rash deed, and where he was not discovered for, it is supposed, two or three days. The identification was made through a couple of tax receipts found in his pockets. Jeweler E. C. Barker of this city, has two watches which were left with him by Taylor, as also a note for a sum of money.

INDIANS WIN FROM R. R.

**Judge Gives them 160,970 Acres
of Land on the Yakima
Reservation.**

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 12.—Indians of the Yakima tribe came into their own when Judge Edward Whitson, sitting in the United States circuit court for the district of eastern Washington, handed down a decision in the suit of the United States vs. the Northern Pacific Railway company, by which 160,970 acres of timber and agricultural lands in the Cedar River valley in the southern part of the Yakima reservation reverts to the red men.

The land is valued at \$2,000,000 and is covered by a mortgage held by the Mercantile Trust company, of New York, to secure an issue of bonds for the first construction of the railroad through Washington. If the findings are sustained by the supreme court of the United States on appeal, it will mean a realignment to the Indians and the readjustment of the entries of several hundred homesteaders in the district, also hasten the opening of 600,000 acres of land in the reservation.

Coos County Building Burned.
Portland, Jan. 10.—The Coos county building at the Lewis and Clark exposition was burned early today by the explosion of films in a moving picture show factory. The Oregon building was also damaged. The loss was about \$5000.

SAN BUENA VENTURA WRECKED.

**Lumber Schooner Driven Ashore and
all on Board Supposed to
Have Perished.**

The lumber carrier San Buena Ventura, which has been carrying lumber from Bandon and other points along the coast to San Francisco and San Pedro, is reported going ashore near the mouth of Rogue river. The Ventura sailed lumber laden from Eureka, California, a short time ago, and it is thought the recent heavy storm has driven her ashore. Men were seen clinging to the rigging at one time, and as none have come ashore, the supposition is that all are lost.

The San Buena Ventura is a two-masted schooner of 171 gross tonnage, and carried a crew of 6 or 7 men.

CAMPAIGN FOR BONUS.

**Coos Bay Will do its Part—Prominent Men Approve of
Project and Conditions.**

The Coos Bay Times reports that the Chamber of Commerce of that city is getting busy soliciting subscriptions to a bonus fund for the Coos Bay and Idaho railway project, the survey of which is being conducted by Messrs. Haines and Stevens, the latter gentleman, with a crew of men now making their headquarters in this city, and working in the foothills opposite town. The Bay people are expected to raise \$150,000, which the business men of Marshfield consider reasonable, and will no doubt sign up liberal sums. We give below the text of the contract submitted, which is self explanatory, and which according to its terms, exacts nothing unless the road is in running order by July 1, 1912. The proposition reads as follows:

"We, the undersigned, each for himself, agrees and promises to pay to the Coos Bay, Oregon and Idaho Railway Company or its successors or assigns, at the general offices of the said company at Marshfield, Coos county, Oregon, the amount set opposite our respective names, on or before thirty (30) days from the date that a locomotive propelled by steam power shall first complete a continuous trip over its railroad from one terminus to the other as contemplated by and in the promise and agreement of said company as below herein written; provided, however, that the said railroad shall be completed for such passage or trip on or before July 1, 1912.

MEETS DEATH BY ACCIDENT.

**John Grannill Falls from Gang
Plank at Bandon and is
Instantly Killed.**

John Grannill, mate on the schooner Hugh Hogan which is lying at Bandon awaiting an opportunity to sail, fell from the gang plank Saturday evening as he was returning on board. He was recovered from the water in a short time by his shipmate, who proceeded in an effort to resuscitate him, but they soon found that in his fall he had struck the railing of the vessel and one leg and his neck were broken. Coroner Golden was called to make an investigation. The body was buried at Bandon Monday under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity, he being a member of that order. He was also a member of the Improved Order of Redmen.
