## Raps Express Companies.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 15.—Arraigning the express companies for making enormous profits on the infringements of the government's right to monopolize the transportation of mail and criticizing the post-office department for surrendering that right, Representative Murdock of Kansas, today introduced a long resolution calling on the Postmaster General for information. The resolution says while the postoffice department last year had a deficit of \$17,000,000, the Wells-Fargo Express Company distributed nearly \$25,000,000 in dividends, and that the government's failure to exercise its monopoly in transporting mails is enriching the express companies.
