H. H. Fellows Drops Dead.

Horace H. Fellows, father of John T. Fellows, formerly in the confectionery business here, but now living in Springfield, this state, dropped dead in his rooms above the Strong implement and warehouse in this city about 5 o'clock Wednesday evening, of heart failure. Mr. Fellows and I. N. Wilson roomed together. Both were in their rooms at the time. Mr. Fellows had just come in off the street and was building a fire in the cook stove when he suddenly fell over backward. Mr. Wilson placed the stricken man in an easy position and then summoned Dr. Johnson who found that life was extinct when he arrived. He had been complaining a little during the day of toothache and other minor pains, but nothing serious was believed to be the matter up to the time of his death. The body was taken to the home of his stepdaughter, Mrs. O. S. Coleman of Myrtle Point Thursday morning and burial will be in the Gravel Ford cemetery, where his wife is buried.

Mr. Fellows was 74 or 75 years of age on December 22nd, last. He was an old resident of this section and was a veteran of the civil war, having served in Co. E., 11th Missouri cavalry, with rank of sergeant, the term of his service being 2 years, 3 months and 14 days.—Myrtle Point enterprise.

Fruit Drops in Price.

"The bottom has dropped out of the fruit market," remarked F. S. Dow who returned today from San Francisco. "Hawaiian fruit is now being put in on the coast in competition with the United States products and the result has been that oranges and bananas are selling at about one-half the ordinary prices. Prospects for the consumer are looking up. Besides the decline in fruit, I am looking for a decline in flour. Barley has gone down and wheat is likely to follow.

"San Francisco is booming and everyone is enthusiastic at the showing that city has made the last six months. For that time, the bank clearances there have been greater each day than the clearances of all the other principal Pacific coast centers, including Spokane." Mr. Dow would not talk much about the rumored deals of the O. C. & N. property, but admitted he had heard various reports in circulation there. One was started in connection with gossip as to what vessel would be put on the Coos Bay run to replace the Czarina. He said that many were claiming the Southern Pacific would take over the O. C. & N. property with the M. F. Plant. Another was that a steam schooner would be chartered and still another was that the City of Panama would be put on the run.

W. F. Miller, agent of the Breakwater and Czarina, stated this afternoon that there was nothing definite as to what vessel would be put on in the Czarina's place.—Coos Bay Times.

Returns to Their Duties.

B. F. Jones and G. W. Riddle have formally assumed their duties as register and receiver of the United States land office in Roseburg, their predecessors, B. L. Eddy and J. M. Lawrence, stepping back into private life Monday night. Mr. Jones has filed with Governor Benson his resignation as joint representative of Lincoln and Polk counties. Mr. Lawrence will leave for his future home at Bend some time this week. Mr. Eddy is now preparing to re-engage in the practice of law in partnership with District Attorney George M. Brown. The firm will occupy offices in the new Masonic temple just as soon as the building is completed. Mr. Brown's present offices in the courthouse will be retained by his deputy.—Roseburg Review.
