## IMPORTANT DAIRY-MAN'S MEETING.

Federal Dairy Inspector Catterlin will be Present—Meeting to be Held in Coquille, February 9.

The result of the endeavor to improve their industry is gratifying to the dairymen of our valley, and with their present educational advantages and the natural adaptability of this section for dairying purposes, the Coquille valley promises to become one of the leading butter and cheese producing districts of the coast. Besides and opportunity for all to improve their stock at a minimum cost of testing, the lower river dairymen have united to have their produce manufactured under one management, and while, as yet, they have not secured methods which will give them the highest possible returns, nevertheless the improvement from their organization is appreciated when the results of previous seasons is compared with their present offers. The insurance of a correct test, an advance of from two to three cents per pound on butterfat with the natural increase of stock and property value is a decided improvement.

The next regular session, February 9th, will be an important and an enthusiastic meeting. W. E. Catterlin, of Tillamook, and Mr. Bessy, of Coos Bay, will address the meeting and an important business session of the United Dairymen will be held. Boats will run to allow a forenoon and an afternoon session. Lunch will be served in the hall and every dairyman of our valley is requested to attend.

Federal Dairy Inspector Catterlin comes from the leading dairying section of the coast, and since the success of that section is due to thorough organization, the value of his assistance is much appreciated.

The stock improvement committee will report some important communications from Mr. C. L. Mitchell, of San Francisco. While the cost of one dollar per cow seems to be considerable for testing, the advantages of such a system is a paying business proposition. Dairymen of other districts, where the testing system is used, are satisfied with their investment and consider it one of the best paying details of their industry. Every dairyman is respectfully invited to attend our next session.

## Orders of County Court.

Besides the allowance of bills and other routine work, the county court made a number of orders, among which were the following:  
Approving the annual tax levy of 18 mills for general purposes, as well as special taxes of a number of road and school districts and cities.

The clerk reported the issuance of warrants on 353 varmint scalps aggregating \$1381.

J. M. Blake, of Marshfield, was granted a franchise for an electric railway over the county road between Marshfield and North Bend for a term of 50 years, and which provides that the line be in operation within 18 months.

The contract for the construction of a bridge across South Slough was awarded Victor Anderson for the sum of \$7785.

The contract for the care of county hospital patients was awarded Jeff D. Wilson, of Coquille.

Road district 29 was formed, being taken wholly from district 4, and other minor changes in boundaries.

The petition for a drainage district in the Norway section was approved by the court and A. J. Radabaugh, R. J. Dean and G. W. Clinton were appointed as trustees.

The contract for publishing officers' reports and county notices were awarded the Coquille Valley Sentinel on lowest bid. The publishing of county court proceedings was awarded the Coos Bay Times and Coquille Herald on largest circulations.
