Port Commission.

There was a meeting held in the office of Judge E. D. Sperry last Thursday to see what could be done toward making preparations for forming a port commission. As result of this meeting there now exists an organization which is known as the Executive Club of the Port of Coquille. The officers of this organization are as follows:

R. S. Knowlton chairman, W. L. Kistner first vice-president, J. C. Moonaw second vice-president, J. C. Savage secretary and L. H. Hazard treasurer.

A committee was appointed who will attend to the printing of the petition and a campaign committee was appointed consisting of men from Coquille, Myrtle Point and Bandon as well as from most of the way points between Coquille and Bandon.

The petition will have to be acted upon by the county court and it will be some time before active work commences, but from the spirit shown by the members of the Executive Club of the Port of Coquille, we expect to feel the effect of the efforts of this new organization soon.

New York, Feb 5.—Safe on board the Mallory liner Alamo, the captain and crew of the steamer Kentucky are speeding today for Key West. The Kentucky lies bottom up off Cape Hatteras, having been wrecked before she was fairly under way on her projected voyage to Seattle.

According to wireless reports, the Alamo reached the sinking vessel in the nick of time to save the crew and captain. Had not the Alamo reached the Kentucky when she did all probably would have been lost, as the other vessels could not have reached her in time.

The Kentucky is a 200-foot wooden craft which was recently purchased by the Alaska-Pacific Steamship Co., and sailed from New York for Seattle January 23rd. She was to have plied between Seattle and Alaskan points the coming season.
